expense to most farmers. Grimm is especially recommended for two or three crop sections. Ladak, a relatively new variety is worthy of trial on dry slope lands or where there is only one crop probable. It makes a heavy first cutting.

We recommend good thick stands of alfalfa that are suited to the normal moisture supply as such stands make finer hay and help keep weeds and grass out. The use of land plaster or sulphur is generally a paying practice when it is put on early in the spring.

Serious attention must be given to time of cutting and manner of making hay to insure good quality and no serious injury to the stand. Generally alfalfa should be cut when the new shoots sprout up from the crowns or when the crop is from 1-10 to 1-4 in bloom. Prompt curing and stacking to prevent the loss of leaves will make better hay.

Thorough cultivation of the alfalfa in the spring before sprouting is recommended if the land is dry enough. Otherwise fall cultivation is next best on pieces that are generally grassy or weedy.

Cutting or chopping of hay is sometimes a good practice but factors determining its practicability are, whether or not there are stock cattle to clean up waste and coarse hay, the cost of cutting, the cost of the hay, and the texture of the hay. There is less justification for cutting where there is fine stemmed leafy hay that is cheap and where stock animals may be fed the coarser or waste hay.

We recommend that the Union Experiment Station begin a cultivation trial for alfalfa, to determine the effect of different times and frequencies of cultivation as well as a comparison of different implements.

We further recommend that the county agent make observations of alfalfa cultivations in the county and arrange trials of soils differing from those of the Station.

Sweet Clover
The Union County sweet clover acreage is increasing. It has additional possibilities as pasture, seed and as hay on some lands. It is a good soil improver and when grown in rotation with wheat should not be allowed to produce seed as the unkill seed is objectionable in the wheat. We recommend that the county agent conduct more trials on land plaster on sweet clover.

Various claims are made as to the feeding effects of sweet clover. It is generally conceded that sweet clover hay with moldy stems is dangerous to feed. Well cured bright hay is satisfactory. Warnings have been printed in livestock journals that animals fed extensively on sweet clover bleed badly when wounded or otherwise injured. Sweet Clover has caused blood in Union County to some extent but is not generally as troublesome as some other legumes in that respect.

Permanent Pastures
More pasture is needed in the dairy farm, farm flock, and other livestock farm systems, both from standpoint of production costs and welfare of the stock. The Union Experiment Station is urged to continue and enlarge its pasture experiments and secure definite data on that subject. A careful study of farm pasture demonstrations is urged for this summer. Especial attention is directed to result with Ladino Clover. We recommend a thorough trial at the Experiment Station to determine the best methods of growing and utilizing the crop in Union County. Trials of dry land grasses and legumes are also recommended.

Mixed grass and legume pastures are generally considered best, using long lived grass and legume where possible.

Alfalfa while one of the best producers of pasture especially for late summer is rather dangerous for sheep and cattle because of blood.

as from peas and grain or sweet clover and grain.

Roots And Cull Potatoes
On many farms without silage Root Crops are recommended for winter succulence for dairy cows, sheep, hogs, horses and poultry. It is recommended that both mangels and carrots be grown. Mangels are generally the highest yielders but in the years of curley top infestation carrots make good yields and assure some succulence.

Where roots are grown as a regular crop, well manured land capable of producing high yields is necessary that the cost per ton be not too expensive. Adequate root cellars should be provided convenient to feeding places to avoid expensive and laborious handling. Storage may generally be in sand underground root cellars in a well drained location. The cellar must be dry dark and well ventilated.

Roots are either fed whole or sliced. Roots cut into small chunks often cause choking.

Cull or low grade potatoes make good stock feed. They are commonly fed to cows in quantities up to 25 or 30 pounds daily after the stock have been made accustomed to them by gradual feeding. They should be cooked or steamed for hogs. In the Yakima Valley they are fed to sheep after lambing time.

Potatoes
No increase in seed or table stock potato acreage is recommended. Certified seed is best by test. Growers willing to do the rouging early and often enough to insure good seed are urged to enter for certification.

Small Seed
An increased acreage of Grimm alfalfa for seed is justified. On some of the more moist soils we recommend trials of Albion Clover and Ladino Clover for seed. Limited production of both white and yellow sweet clover is desirable.

Field and canning peas offer some seed possibilities and should be investigated.

Weed Control
Further study of chemical and other methods of weed control are recommended for the county agent as a part of the program of work. Sodium Chlorate is the most promising of the chemical weed killers. It is only moderately expensive but because of its high inflammability especially when it impregnates clothing, etc. It must be carefully and only by people who recognize its dangerous qualities and are prepared to protect themselves.

Several people have been seriously burned but this is unnecessary when proper precautions are taken.

The state weed law is probably inadequate in that certain fields are some times allowed to produce a crop of weed seeds that may infest the whole adjoining country. Under the law measures may be taken to force the control of such

weeds but if done in time in certain instances some crop would also be destroyed. No compensation for loss being available, neighbors hesitate to petition for a local district to enforce destruction.

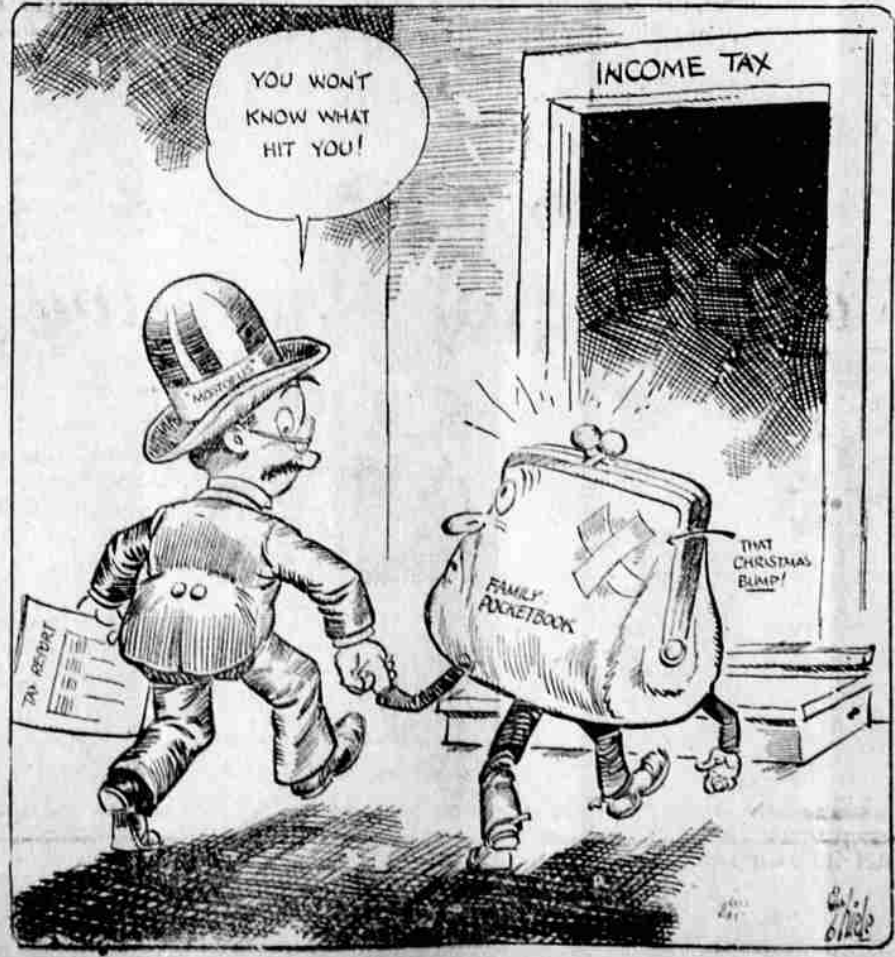
draw in a main event fight here last night.

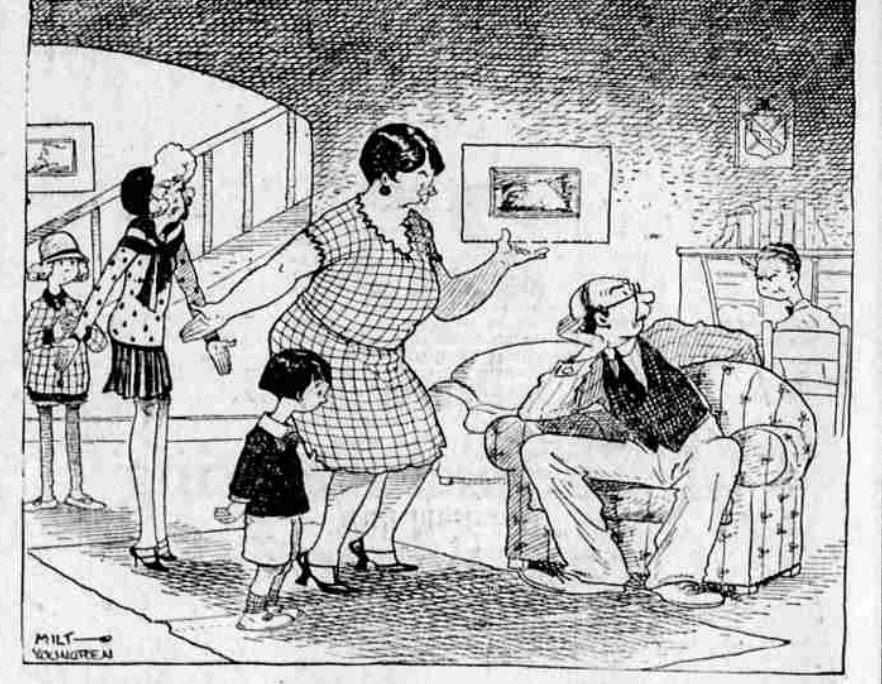
