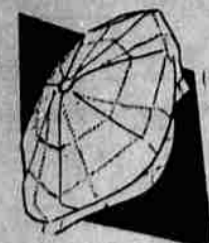

Egg And Butter Prices Steady In Today's Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., March 13 (A. P.)—Egg and butter prices were unchanged today. Retail prices for eggs as listed at the Yamhill street public market by the city market manager were 27 and 25 cents.

Wholesale buying prices at the dairy exchange were 24 and 23c. Green peas from the south were down one cent to 12 and 20c.

Onions continue weak despite their reported scarcity. Buyers were still reluctant to accept offerings.

Fruits, poultry and fresh meats showed no change.

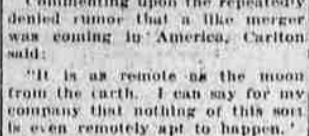

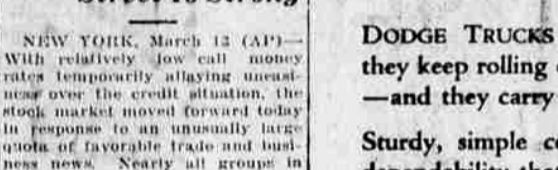

Closing Tone In Street Is Strong

NEW YORK, March 13 (AP)—With relatively low call money rates temporarily allaying uneasiness over the credit situation, the stock market moved forward today in response to an unusually large quota of favorable trade and business news. Nearly all groups in the industrial division participated in the upswing, which ran from 2 to nearly 10 points in many issues, with copper, public utilities and steel.

Shading of the call money rate to 6 per cent again brought another outbreak of buying in the last hour when some of the volatile issues displayed marked buoyancy. Radio (old) mounted 12 points, Peoples Gas 9 and Johns-Manville 7. Contrary to the general trend, Russia Insurance fell back 5 points after yesterday's jump of nearly 22 points and A. M. Hays lost 4 points. The closing tone was strong. Total sales approximated 3,200,000 shares.

War Cuts Supply Mexican Tomatoes

LOS ANGELES, March 12 (AP)—War in Mexico seems to be cutting off the supply of Mexican tomatoes. A report today by the United States Agriculture Bureau of economics said an embargo on freight traffic along the Mexican west coast might be one reason for tomato imports dropping to 70 cars for the last week. Some Mexican tomatoes, however, are moving to Los Angeles by boat.

Prices on tomatoes from Mexico have advanced sharply, and are now ranging from \$2.75 to \$4.00 per box.

HOSPITAL BILL AHEAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 13 (AP)—The government spent \$450 convicting Rufus Abbott of possession of liquor and keeping him in a hospital until he was physically fit for jail. Then it was discovered that President Coolidge had remitted the \$200 fine Abbott was supposed to serve out in prison. He was a hospital bill ahead.

SINGLE TAX MEASURE WILL BE INITIATED

SALEM, Ore., March 13 (AP)—Preliminary filing for the initiation of a single tax measure was filed with the secretary of state today by the Oregon single tax league, 271 Market street, Portland. It proposes an amendment to the state constitution. The papers were sent to the attorney general for checking and ballot title.

The bill will propose that from March 1, 1931, to March 1, 1935, all revenue for state, county and municipal purposes shall be raised by a tax on the value of land irrespective of improvements, and thereafter that the full rental value of the land be taken in lieu of all other taxes.

C. N. Laughrie, deputy secretary of state, said that 15,555 names will be required on the petition. The measure could not be voted on until the November election in 1930.
