BOSTON RED SOX STILL HOPEFUL

Two Score Players Trying for Positions; Fight for Every Position

By Brian Bell (Associated Press Sports Writer) BRADENTON, Fla., Mar. 14 (AP)—The Boston Red Sox, last in the American league but trying to do better, have blasted out baseball superstition—that the rich become richer and the poor get poorer. The Red Sox have more players in camp than any club in Major League.

Manager Bill Carrigan during the course of two daily workouts looks at more than two score earnest, perspiring athletes in Boston uniforms. If half of them are major league players the manager will be very happy.

Plenty of Size The Red Legs are well in the first division in size. More than half the members of the big squad will measure five feet, 11 inches or more. Billy Payne, who has been a wanderer upon the face of the baseball earth, looks like the club boy in this company of slabs, although he is five nine and scales 160 pounds.

Hob Reeves, one of the quintet, taken from Washington in the trade for Buddy Myer, seems certain to become regular third baseman for the Sox. Grant Gillis, a shortstop, while he may not be able to displace the veteran Wally Gerber altogether, probably will share the assignment with the former Brown, and Elliott Bigelow who can hit has only to demonstrate an ability to throw to get an outfield assignment.

Fight For Every Place The two pitchers in the transaction, Milton Gaston and Horace Lisenbee have not had sufficient opportunity to qualify but both have shown indications of returning to form, which was lost last season. There is a fight for every position with no election indicated until all the returns are in. At first base Phil Todd, an able performer, will again serve but Jerry Standaert, from Memphis, has shown something. Bill Regan should have an advantage at second but another Bill, Narkley from Mobile has done well. A pair of Bobs, Reeves and Barrett, another former major leaguer are battling and in addition to Gerber and Gillis at short, Hal Rhyne, who seems a much better player than when he was with Pittsburg, is showing as much ambition as any man in camp.

CHICAGO CUBS LEAVE AVALON ON LONG TOUR

AVALON, Catalina Island, Cal., Mar. 14 (AP)—Manager Joe McCarthy and his ambitious Cubs packed their clubs and prepared to leave this magic island today for their long exhibition tour on the mainland.

A series with Los Angeles will open their exhibition program tomorrow. With the exception of Catcher Leo Hartnett and Elwood English, youthful shortstop, all of the Cubs appeared in good physical condition. Hartnett and English are fans from their workouts. Manager McCarthy has not decided on the third base problem yet, but with Clyde Beck, Norman McMillan and Clarence Blair, he has some good prospects.

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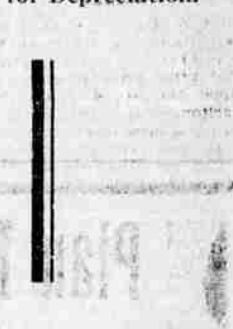
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OREGON PREPARES FOR TRACK MEET

Northern Conference Championship Event to Be Held at Eugene

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Mar. 14 (Special)—Altho the big northern conference championship track and field meet is several weeks away, Bill Hayward, veteran Oregon coach, is making preparations to make it the biggest event of its kind ever held in the northwest. A classy field is expected here May 31 and June 1, and while Washington has the inside track to take the team laurels, the Huskies will find plenty of competition, Hayward says.

Washington has many star performers, the outstanding being Steve Anderson and Burns Keiser. Anderson was second in the high hurdles in the Olympic games, while Keiser won the national championship in the mile in the last time of 4:17. Hartley, a freshman last year, who a couple of years ago won the national intercollegiate meet in the quarter-mile, is a youth showing much promise, as is Pendleton, another Husky sophomore, who bids fair to become one of the country's leading sprinters.

Colored Awe to Sprint Wesley Foster, colored Washington State college sprinter, in the leading northern candidate in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Foster has been clocked at 9.4-5 in the 100 and 21.3-5 in the 220—which is exceptionally fast time.

BAKER, Ore., Mar. 14—A number of baseball fans meeting in the Pastime last night formed a Baker baseball club with a view of entering the Blue Mountain league with La Grande, Pendleton and Enterprise and elected C. E. Jones president of the organization. James Burnett was elected secretary, treasurer and William Radabaugh, E. C. Hrocket, Ren Black, Carsten Hansen and C. E. Jones directors.

The Elks club, which was asked to sponsor the team, declined at a meeting last night, but a number of Elks volunteered as individuals to take tickets and check the receipts.

The schedule as planned by the team already entered in the league would start April 21 and end July 7, making a total of 12 games, six of which would be played at home. The newly formed club decided to hold enough benefit exhibition games during the season to pay off the remainder of last year's debt. The officers of the club plan to sell eight-game tickets for \$5, including admission to the grandstand. The La Grande club was informed over the long distance telephone that the Baker club wants to play its opening game here instead of in La Grande.

He was stricken with pneumonia at his home a week ago. Death occurred last night. He was 44 and is survived by Mrs. Magee and three children. Baseball fans of 20 years ago will recall Sherry Magee, then an outfielder with the Phillies as one of the greatest natural basemen in the game. He led the National league in hitting in 1910, with an average of .311.

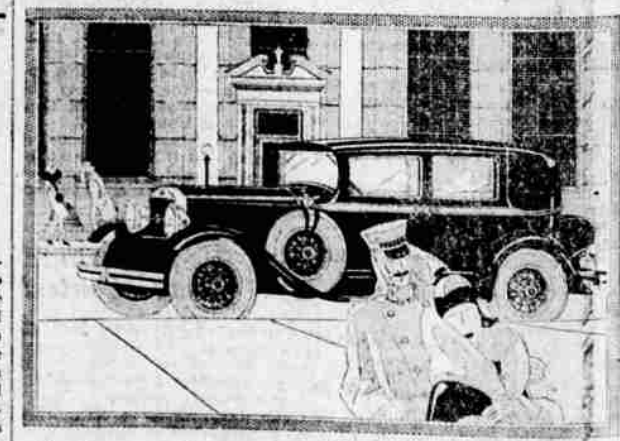
