BLEEDING GUM TISSUE EVIDENCES IMMEDIATE NEED OF DENTAL INSPECTION AND ADVICE

Most all dentists advise their patients to have their mouths examined at least once every six months and in special cases more often. This advice is given for the welfare of the patients. Our foods today are so soft that it is hardly necessary to chew half the food we eat. As a result of this, there is little or no massaging of the gums in the process of mastication.

There is a method of brushing the teeth that will produce the same massaging effect as that produced by chewing coarse foods, but many people will not spend the time necessary to accomplish this, which is another reason for frequent examinations.

Tartar, the hard film-like substance that forms around the neck of the teeth on the inside of the upper back ones, due to calcium in the saliva, causes pressure on the gum tissues and results in a recession of the soft tissue and bone, if left on the teeth very long. This tartar should be scaled off and the teeth polished often to avoid recession, which is one indication of pyorrhea.

One of the peculiar characteristics of pyorrhea is that it gives little or no inconvenience until it becomes serious. It is comparable in this respect to tuberculosis and certain heart conditions in which the patient often does not suffer to any extent until the trouble has advanced beyond hope of recovery.

Bleeding gum tissue is an indication of pyorrhea. And I might say here that no tooth paste or powder on the market will cure this condition. You should get a competent dentist's advice immediately. He will note any unusual condition of the mouth and treat it accordingly.

Cavities in teeth should be found when they are very small, to save the most tooth structure and to safeguard the pulp (nerve) from destruction by irritation and infection from bacteria in the decay. All cavities should be filled before they even get sensitive. Cavities will never get large if you have frequent examinations. Then all chances for decay to encroach upon and destroy the pulp are eliminated.

I have had many patients tell me that their teeth were soft. They had been eating and broke a piece out of a tooth and didn't know there was a cavity in it. This

cavity was on a surface in between the teeth and was quite large before the chewing surface broke through. There is a way of finding cavities between the teeth when they are very small by the use of the bite-wing x-ray examination.

Remember it is for the patient's interest, to safeguard him from disease, that the dentist wishes to make frequent examinations, to prevent rather than to repair after the damage is done.

Income Taxes In Treasury Vaults Exceed Estimate

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15 (AP)—Income taxes pouring into the treasury vaults from all sections of the country are exceeding estimates made by treasury officials. Secretary Mellon said today that he felt there not only would be no deficit for the fiscal year 1929, but that there would be a comfortable surplus.

First payments of the income tax on Mar. 15 of last year totaled \$57,137,757 and officials have expected that this amount would be exceeded this year. The corporation taxes this year are one and one-half per cent lower than they were in 1927 when that tax was 12 1/2 per cent. It is expected, however, that the lower rate would bring in a greater return. Total income taxes collected in the calendar year of 1928 were \$2,169,417,231.

Secretary Mellon said that the increase over what had been expected on Wednesday amounted to \$1,000,000,000 more than had been estimated.

Salmon in Millions

Ocean Levels

The mean level of the Pacific ocean at the isthmus of Panama has been found to be about eight inches higher than the mean level of the Atlantic. In the month of February the mean levels are the same, but throughout the rest of the year, on account of current, tidal and wind influences, the mean level of the Pacific ranges above that of the Atlantic. It is as much as one foot higher in October.

Bayberry Candles

In making bayberry candles the berries are collected from the bayberry bush and boiled in pots of water. The wax rises to the top, is skimmed off, and boiled again. Regular candle sticks are cut the desired length, attached to a rod dipped in warm water and then dipped into the pot of wax several times. Allow the wax to harden between times. 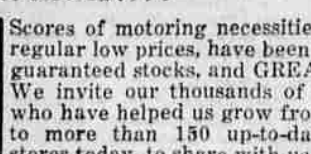

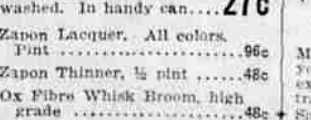
