## President Inlow Addresses Meeting

The moral training of high school students, which constitutes a difficult problem in adolescent years, was discussed briefly by H. E. Inlow, president of the Eastern Oregon Normal school, at the Classroom Teachers' association meeting yesterday afternoon at the McJawawek Inn.

"High school students examine standards and sanctions and we need to give them the standards which they will accept," Mr. Inlow asserted.

The encouragement and direction

of sound emotional responses was stressed.

"Human conduct is determined by how we feel about things, not how we think about them," he said.

"Motivation for Learning in High School" was the topic of Mr. Inlow's address and was the theme of the afternoon program which was in charge of W. W. Thomas, chairman of the professional committee.

There are three causes of motivation, President Inlow stated. First, there is the nature of the home which should furnish stimulus for learning by saturating the child with ambition and desire.

Next, the character and influence of the teacher, and his skill, is important," Mr. Inlow continued. Environment and objectives, Mr. Inlow also stressed as important for motivation.

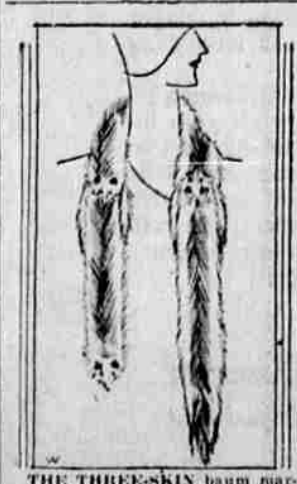


FRANCES MAY
