"At first residents of the town drifted about in canoes in the shallow waters, somewhat inclined to take the flood as a joke. "In an hour or two conditions changed, and what at first appeared to be an expensive lark grew to be a grim, serious situation, in which strong men battled to save lives and homes."

CASTLEBERRY FLOODED

MOBILE, Ala., Mar. 15 (AP)—The high water is up to the eaves of houses at Castleberry, Alabama, a strawberry center, according to a message received by the American Telephone and Telegraph company, and residents there were perched on roofs and in attics. Floodwaters reported 12 feet of water in low parts of the city, Hill Jackson, a noted long distance swimmer, rescued a line man from drowning, according to the report here.

COMMUNICATION CUT OFF

MOBILE, Ala., Mar. 15 (AP)—The last telephone connection with Brewton, Ala., went out at 1:20 this morning. At that time several houses were entirely under water. The water reached the second floor of the telephone exchange and the operators were rescued by boats.

While the rebels have been inactive for the past few days on the west coast, General Matias was again reported en route to take command of the insurgent forces near Mazatlan. Many Americans are stranded in Torreon, unable to obtain traveling funds because of the closing of banks. Others are arriving at Juarez having succeeded in leaving the beleaguered city. Five high ranking rebel officers have been executed in Vera Cruz after courtmartial.

DETERMINE POLICY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15 (AP)—The state department has submitted to President Hoover a suggested policy to be pursued with respect to Mexican rebels who cross the border into this country. Announcement of the details of the policy was left to the white house by the department. Large amounts of war materials, including tank gas, arms and ammunition have been ordered from American manufacturers by the Mexican government. The orders have been placed through the Mexican embassy here.
