PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 18 (AP)—Trial of Blurton Baker, Klamath Indian charged with the murder of Bidwell Kiddle, fellow tribesman, on Nov. 28, last, was to be resumed in federal district court at 2 p. m. today.
The trial was temporarily suspended last week because of the illness of a juror.
