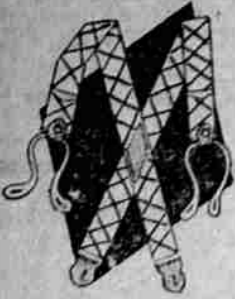

Heavy hens advanced from 25 to 26 cents; medium hens from 21 to 23c; light hens from 18 to 20 to 21c; locators from 22 to 25 to 26; springs from 25 and 28 to 28 and 29; Peking ducks from 26 and 28 to 29; capons from 23 and 25 to 26 and 28.

Clover and Alfalfa Seed Production Money Maker

(Continued from Page 7) a corresponding time. The higher prices may curtail demand to some extent but because of small stocks in this country and Canada, which countries produce the bulk of the world supply, the carryover is expected to be unusually small.

Alfalfa Seed

Apparently Oregon farmers intend to increase their acreage of alfalfa seed 40 per cent in 1929. The sample census and intentions to produce survey indicated that there will be an increase of 100 per cent of Grimm alfalfa for seed, but the acreage is comparatively small.

"Alfalfa seed production in 1921 was about 40 per cent smaller than in 1927. The decrease was mainly because of a marked reduction in yields, particularly in two of the largest producing states, Utah and Idaho, and shorter crops in several other states. Imports during the year ended June 30, 1928, totalling 182,500 pounds, were only about one-tenth the average for the past 5 years; since July 1 imports have continued in nearly the same proportion, reflecting another short crop in Canada. More seed, however, is expected to be imported from Turkistan during the next 5 or 10 weeks than during the same period in any year since 1920.

Present supplies of domestic alfalfa are smaller than those for a number of years, but are expected to meet spring seeding requirements, which may, however, be affected somewhat by prevailing prices, the highest since 1920 and nearly 25 per cent above the average for the past five years."
