**GASOLINE PRICE IS STEADY TODAY**

Portland Dealers Agree on 22 1/2c; La Grande Price 27 Cents

PORTLAND, Mar. 20 (AP)—All service stations today had posted the new 22 1/2 cent price on gasoline, although there was still some variance in the wholesale rates.

The general company which sold at low cost to dealers yesterday had raised its wholesale price today to 19 1/2 cents, leaving the Texas company the only distributor still selling at 19 1/2 cents wholesale.

Officers of the Texas company were to arrive here late today from Los Angeles and announcement of the firm's future policy was expected.

The majority of the service stations in La Grande adopted a uniform price of 27 cents a gallon yesterday, the change going into effect at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

**Wheat Nervous And Somewhat Higher**

CHICAGO, March 20 (AP)—Opening 3/4 to 1 1/2c off, wheat later displayed little power to rally. Corn started 1/2 to 1 1/2c down, and subsequently underwent some additional setback. Oats were easy. Provisions likewise sagged.

Wheat closed nervous at a shade to 1/2c net advance; corn 1/2 to 3/4c down; oats unchanged to 1/2c off and provisions unchanged to a setback of 12 cents.

**Asks Hoover To Explain His Views**

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20 (AP)—President Hoover was requested today by Representative Dickinson, republican, Iowa, to have Secretary Hyde appear before the house agriculture committee and explain the president's views on farm relief. Mr. Dickinson said that in view of the fact that the chief executive's ideas would not reach congress normally until his message is read at the outset of the special session, it would be extremely helpful if the committee in its deliberations before that time could have some specific knowledge of Mr. Hoover's views.

**WOMAN, POLICEMEN Are Involved In California Case**

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 20 (AP)—Self charged as "the woman" Mrs. Callie Grimes prepared to march to court today with five policemen, a racketeer and a politician, all charged with a morals plot against Councilman Carl J. Jacobson. Mrs. Grimes was brought back from El Paso, Texas, where she said, in fear of her life, after testifying before the grand jury. Until yesterday she was the state's star witness. Her last word before entering court today was that she would take her chances on going to San Quentin rather than testify again against the seven whose indictments she brought about when she branded the morals charge against the councilman as a "police and political frameup."
