Baseball Wise Railbirds Expect Indians to Make Better Showing

By Brian Bell (Associate Press Sports Writer) NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 21 (AP)—Baseball wise railbirds who compare the Cleveland Indians of 1929 with the 1928 edition say the club has been improved more than any other outfit in the American league.

However, the remade team will offer a far bolder front than it was able to present last season. The infield has been strengthened by the addition of the little but rugged Jackie Tavener and transfer of Joey Sewell to third base.
