## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
Cheese is often chosen as a meat substitute and if served with the proper combination of foods offers an excellent and comparatively cheap source of protein.

The hard American cheese made from whole milk contains most of the protein and fat and a large part of the lime of the milk from which it was made. It's really a concentrated form of milk and has great food value. This type of cheese adds the vitamin necessary for growth to one's diet, but is lacking in other essentials.

In planning menus in which cheese is to play a part as a meat substitute, keep in mind the necessity of serving plenty of vegetables, both raw and cooked, and a simple dessert. Apple or any fruit tart, oat pudding served with "liquid" sauce in place of cream offers a

greenish color. Cheese should be cooked, care must be taken that it is not over-cooked. Over-cooking of cheese makes it tough and splits the fat, making it difficult to digest. Cheese is sufficiently cooked when it is just melted. An excellent way to use cheese is in a cream sauce, but it must not be added to the sauce until the sauce is thoroughly cooked. Then the cheese is melted before serving.

The following menu will suggest other combinations:

Brown rice croquettes with cheddar sauce, buttered string beans, lettuce and tomato salad, baked apple dumplings with lemon sauce, milk, coffee.

**Potatoes Au Gratin.**  
Slice potatoes thin; place in buttered pan with alternate layers of sprinkling of flour, peppers, salt, butter and grated cheese. Cover all with milk. Bake in slow oven half hour.
