Wall Street Is Worrying Over Credit Situation

NEW YORK, March 22 (AP)—A sweeping reaction in stock prices today reflected Wall street's growing uneasiness over the credit situation. "Bull" traders succeeded in bringing out an early rally on the strength of no change being made in the New York Federal Reserve rediscount rate, but Chicago dispatches indicating the possibility of an increase in that city, coupled with reports that the Federal Reserve Board was in session at Washington finally brought a large volume of selling into the market, checking the advance and sending scores of issues 2 to 7 points below yesterday's final quotations.

A further advance in copper prices to 24 cents a pound, the highest since the war, failed to stem the flood of selling in the copper shares. Kennecott and Utah each broke about 5 points, International Nickel 4 and a number of others in that group 2 to 3 points.

Wright Aeronautical was hammered down 7 points, National Cash Register 6, Johns Manville, Simmons Company, May Department Stores, Bethlehem Steel, and U. S. Steel Common all advanced 4 to 5 points, under the storm of selling orders which blew into the market in the early afternoon.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Mar. 22 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The week has been a very quiet one in the local trade, with prices hardly changed. Medium grades are easy. Many of the manufacturers and dealers, too, have been in attendance on the wool pageant in New York and have thought little about the raw material apparently. Initial ordering of manufactured goods for the heavyweight season is believed to be below normal, and it is hoped that patent may stimulate business. In the west little or nothing is being done."

"Foreign markets are all very firm, in fact, rather against the buyer, except possibly at the latter Plate. London closed active and firm."

"Mohair is deadily dull and prices difficult to quote. No news of movement is received from the west."
