The Italian way of serving graté cheese with soup has much in its favor. Potato, tomato and spinach cream soups gain much nourishment if graté hard cheese is added when served or passed at the table. The combination of flavors, cheese and these particular vegetables, is good. Cheese must not be added to a soup during cooking.

There are many varieties of cheese, both domestic and imported, and for classification purposes they are conveniently divided into three groups—hard, semi-hard and soft.

All varieties of cheese should be kept in a cool place, the hard and semi-hard varieties wrapped in paraffine paper to prevent drying. Cottage cheese is high in nutri-

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ive value but low in vitamins and fat since it is made of soured skimmed milk. Freshly soured milk is desirable for making cottage cheese since too many bacteria will develop a bitter taste.

Cottage as well as the other soft cream cheeses are excellent in salads or with fresh fruits. Canned fruit stewed dried from a can with cream cheese for a salad or dessert. Crisp toasted crackers should accompany either.

Cheese Fondue or Souffle

One and one-half cups bread crumbs, 2-3 cup milk, 1/2 cup grat-

ed cheese, 4 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, yolks 2 eggs, whites 3 eggs.

The recipe will serve four persons.

Use crumbs from soft part of loaf. Cook crumbs and milk until hot and smooth, stirring constantly. Add butter, salt and pepper and cheese and cook until cheese is melted. Remove at once from heat and add yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. When firm to the touch of the fondue is done.
