MONEY SQUEEZE
STRIKES MARKET

Ticker 92 Minutes Behind
at Close; Curb Market
Also in Frenzy

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 (AP)—In a record-breaking volume of trading, which ran around 8,000,000 shares, Wall Street today experienced one of the most riotous sessions in history, coincident with another "money squeeze" which sent the rate on call loans from 12 to 20 per cent.

Prices of scores of issues broke \$5 to nearly \$25 a share, with the ticker falling hopelessly behind the market under the swollen streams of orders which poured over the wires and cables from all sections of the country and the world. Brisk rallies developed in a few issues in the last hour of trading, but others were thrown into the market in blocks of 500 and 10,000 shares, or more as weakened marginal accounts were liquidated regardless of price.

92 Minutes Late.
As the market closed, the stock exchange ticker was 92 minutes late, with indications that the last minute flurry of trading would delay the printing of the final quotation for nearly two hours after the closing gong had sounded.

A similar reaction took place on the New York curb market, with the ticker 50 minutes behind the market when the session ended.

One block of 22,000 shares of National Cash Register was dumped into the market at \$120 a share, a drop of \$9.25 below yesterday's quotations, and \$28.75 below the year's high established last Wednesday.

Heavy Losses.

Brooklyn Edison showed the largest individual loss with an extreme decline of \$34.50 a share. Adams Express sold \$26 a share below yesterday's close. Wright Aeronautical \$23. International Match Preferred \$18. A. M. Byers \$17.50. John Manville \$16.25. International Telephone \$16. Greene Cananea Copper \$13.50. Anaconda Copper \$13. American & Foreign Power and Allied Chemical \$12 each. Packard \$11.50. and Chrysler, Radio-Kellogg-Albee, Warner Bros. Pictures, Advance Rumley \$10 to \$11, but some of these losses were cut down by the late rally.

Call money had not touched 20 per cent in New York since the post war deflation crisis of 1920. On February 5 of that year, call loans renewed at 17 per cent and closed at 20 per cent.

Heavy withdrawals of funds by out-of-town banks and corporations and the disinclination of New York bankers to supply fresh funds, either because of a desire to cooperate with the Federal Reserve Board or to conserve cash resources in anticipation of unusually heavy April disbursements, accounted for the acute credit situation.

Eggs Go Lower
Today; Butter
Remains Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 26 (AP)—Despite predictions that eggs had reached the rock bottom, two grades declined today. Fresh standard firsts went down to 22 from 23c and fresh medium extras from 22 to 21c. Other grades were unchanged.

Butter also remained unchanged although the undertone was weak. The only other material change in the market was a decline of 20 cents a barrel on all grades of flour.
