## I. C. C. Refuses To Decide Rail, Bus Question

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27 (AP) — The interstate commerce commission yesterday refused to decide whether railroads have the right to operate motor bus lines for passenger transportation.

The issue was placed before it by A. J. Joloff, operator of a bus line out of Portland, Ore., who complained that the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway had entered into competition with his enterprise by running busses between Portland and Astoria, both in Oregon.

The commission pointed out that the railroad had organized a subsidiary corporation to operate the busses and determine that there was no jurisdiction conferred upon it as a regulatory body to decide the practice unlawful. The railroad company was warned to make joint bus and rail passenger rate publication in lawful form, but the complaint of the bus owner was dismissed without action.
