

CHEERING SIGNS IN WALL STREET

Worst Is Over in Acute Credit Pinch; Stock Prices Soar

NEW YORK, Mar. 27 (AP)—The "bull" party regained complete control on the New York stock exchange this afternoon and bid up a wide assortment of issues to nearly \$20 a share.

NEW YORK, Mar. 27 (AP)—Wall Street saw signs today that the worst was over in the acute credit pinch, and after a period of uncertainty caused by a call money renewal rate of 15 per cent, stock prices headed upward along a broad front.

The National City Bank, which supplied the money market with funds yesterday when the call money rate threatened to go above 20 per cent today announced it would continue its policy of lending assistance when necessary.

It was pointed out that there had been no concerted action among banks to supply the money market with funds or any suggestions or intimations that this be done by the Federal Reserve Board.

The recent decline apparently has had a sobering effect on speculative sentiment, and trading showed a marked reduction in volume today. This was due, in part, to the fact that thousands of small speculators had exhausted their margins and were not in a position to participate, and also to the disinclination of others to speculate in a period of credit uncertainty.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 27 (AP)—Eggs began to perk up today after having hovered at the lowest price in years. Standard extras advanced one cent to 25, fresh standard firsts two cents to 24 and fresh medium extras one cent to 22. Medium firsts remained at 20.

Country meats were steady. Roast beefs were steady. Some of the best brought \$2 a crate. Other grades were selling from \$1.40 to \$1.75. Onions and spinach were both easier.

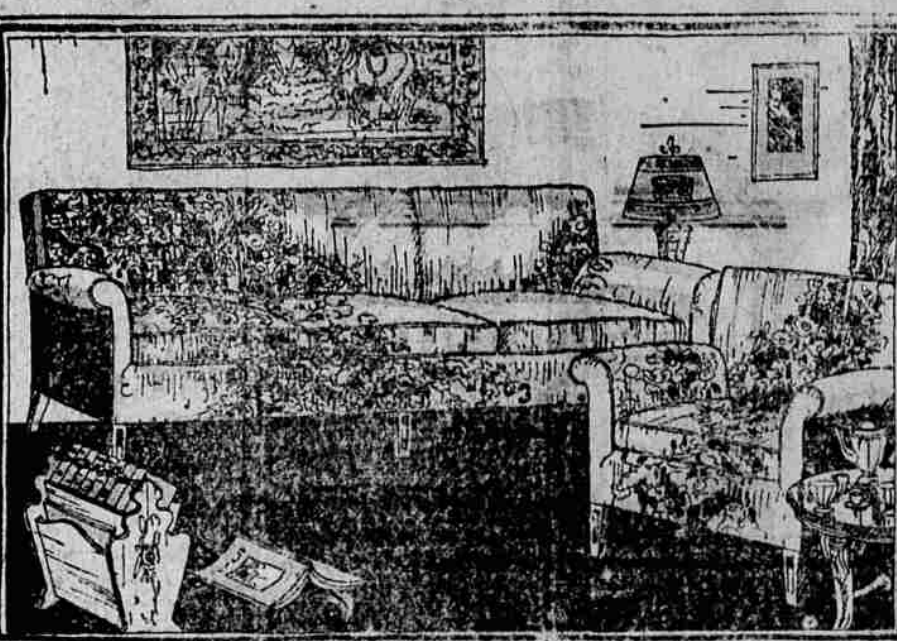

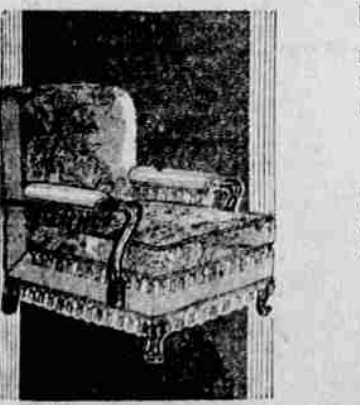

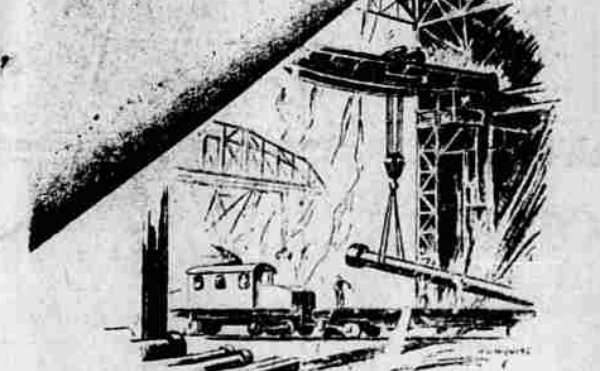
