## MENUS

There is no meal of the day more important than the first one. This meal actually and literally breaks our fast. During the night the stomach has had a chance to rest from its labors and in the morning should be ready for food. However, if the evening meal has been late and the heartless meal of the day the stomach is apt to rebel at the thought of food early in the morning.

This condition will encourage fickleness of appetite and finickiness of mind on the part of adults, making breakfast a difficult problem for the housewife.

Children who have had a light supper of nourishing, easily digested food need a good breakfast. This same good breakfast is essential for the man and woman who are engaged in physical labor. The woman who is planning to do the "family wash" will need a heartier breakfast than her husband, who will work at his desk all day.

The child's breakfast should furnish every essential for proper nourishment. His stomach has been without food for the longest period during the twenty-four hours and is ready for a meal which will supply food for growth as well as energy. Fruit or fruit juice, hot or cold cereal with thin cream or top milk, milk or cocoa made with milk, toast, and a soft cooked egg is an example of a well balanced breakfast for a growing child. This menu, of course, may be varied to suit individual conditions.

Variety is indeed the spice of life and is there any time in the whole day when one needs a little spice more than in the morning? The good housewife who would send her family forth one hundred per cent efficient for the day's work or pleasure will try to get as much variety as possible into her breakfast menu.

**School Teacher Kidnaped, Found**

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Mar. 28 (AP)—Suffering from shock and bruises, Miss Margaret Dodson, 20, remained in the Nanticoke state hospital today, while search continued for two men and a woman who kidnaped her and abandoned her in a wooded section. She is a teacher at the rural school in Mullenberg.

She was seized at the school yesterday and, while her frightened pupils looked on, was thrown into an automobile. Some of the children ran to their homes and told their parents, who notified state police.

Searchers found her in the woods several hours later and after being taken to the hospital she frequently lapsed into unconsciousness.

Arrested woman after chase: BALTIMORE, Mar. 28 (AP)—After a chase across the court house yard and along several streets Deputy Sheriff Rame Burkhardt yesterday took into custody Rose Randall, 20, who is wanted at Klamath Falls on a felony charge the nature of which is not known here. Miss Randall spent three weeks in the Marion county jail in 1926 for shoplifting.

CONVICT'S ESCAPE: CHICO, Cal., Mar. 28 (AP)—Four convicts escaped from road camp No. 17 on the new North Fork highway, 35 miles east of here last night. Armed posse were searching the countryside.

The escaped convicts are Francis Worcester, Marion Comley, burglars; J. R. McCumber and Lloyd Wilkins, serving terms for violation of the motor vehicle act.
