Miss Collett, needing a 77 to tie, started with a par and a birdie on the first two holes but later began miffing her chances on the greens. She scored an 80, however, five strokes better than she was able to produce the first day.

**Oregon Angling For Callison To Help Grid Coach**

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 29 (AP)—Coach Callison, producer of championship football and basketball teams at Medford High school for several years, may come to the University of Oregon next fall as chief coach of the Oregon freshman squads.  
Negotiations have been under way for several weeks, Virgil D. Earl, director of athletics at the University of Oregon, said Friday. Callison has not been elected to the position, but the position has been tendered. Earl said he will be formally elected on his acceptance.  
Efforts to reach Callison at Medford were unsuccessful. Friends of Callison said he had left town for a couple of days and it was reported that he was on his way to Eugene to confute final arrangements with the University.  
"Nothing final has been done or can be done until we hear from Callison," Earl said. "He is a very fine coach and a very fine young man and we will be glad to have him if he decides to accept, although we have understood there was another offer which he had to consider before giving us his answer."

**SPRING GRID PRACTICE TO START MONDAY**

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 29 (AP)—Forty-five football players will report Monday to John J. McKwan, Oregon grid coach for spring practice at the University of Oregon. **Pyle Circus To Start Across The Continent**

NEW YORK, March 30 (AP)—A circus will leave tomorrow on a four month journey across the country, led by the master Barker and promoter, Charles C. Pyle, with his own tent, seven truck loads of paraphernalia, side shows, vaudeville performers, hot dog men—and 100 runners.  
It's the second annual edition of Pyle's buxton derby, idler and acie debacle. Last year he conducted a cross-country foot race with 55 finishers. They came from California across the Rocky mountains, searing deserts, through 350 towns and cities, over sand, mud, concrete and pavements into New York.
