Mission Hurler Killed Sunday In Auto Wreck

MERCED, Cal., April 1 (AP)—Pitcher Clyde L. (Farmer) Nance, 21, of the San Francisco Mission baseball team, was killed Sunday in an automobile accident. Nance was enroute from Turlock to Fowler with T. J. Patton of Turlock. While driving at high speed at a point four miles south of here, according to authorities who investigated, Nance attempted to pass another machine without sounding his horn. The other car at the same moment swerved to the left to pass a preceding car without sounding its horn. Patton told officers, Nance's car was crowded from the highway and plunged into the ditch where it overturned. He died shortly after reaching the hospital. His companion was uninjured.

Nance had an excellent record as a pitcher and was expected to have developed into major league material. He came to the Mission club from the Seattle Coast league club last year.

CROSS COUNTRY ACHE AND PAIN PARADE BEGINS

ELIZABETH, N. J., April 1 (AP)—The second edition Charles C. Pyle's cross country ache and pain parade is off to a good and apparently profitable start.
