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Report Terrible Famine Conditions

LONDON, Apr. 1 (AP)—The Daily Express in a dispatch from Nairobi Kenya, today describes "terrible famine conditions" in the Ruanda district of the Belgian Congo. The account was credited to Dr. J. E. Church, British missionary working there.

Owing to the successive failure of crops during two or three rainy seasons, the backward state of agriculture, and indifferent state of communications, thousands are dead and dying of starvation, according to the minister.

Meningitis Severe Now in Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Apr. 1 (AP)—Shanghai health authorities have become alarmed at rapid spread of cerebro-spinal meningitis among natives and foreigners here. Since the first of February the disease has approached epidemic stage and more than 1,000 cases are under treatment here.

Many of those stricken have died, among them nine foreigners. Twenty-five foreigners have contracted the disease.

DOUBLE ONION ACREAGE FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP)—Indications point to a 50 per cent increase in Colorado's onion acreage this year. Prices were higher in 1922 than a year ago, while both the acreage and yield per acre were lower.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP)—Certification of poultry is growing in favor among Maryland breeders. Records show 15,000 chickens were inspected last season, of which 12,000 met requirements for certification.
