H. E. Inlow, president of the Eastern Oregon Normal school, was given a sincere welcome to the city of La Grande by the chamber of commerce today when he was introduced to each person present by A. T. Hill, president of the city commission. Mr. Inlow was given a standing ovation when A. W. Nelson, president of the chamber, introduced him and, in his opening remarks, he expressed deep appreciation of the reception given to him.

One of his first statements was to the effect that the summer session of the new school will be opened on June 17 and that, instead of a six-week term, the 1929 session will take up a full quarter. The term, however, will be divided into two divisions for the convenience of students.

Speaks of Responsibility
Speaking of the responsibility which he accepted as the new school, Mr. Inlow stated: "The community very evidently desired to render service." He then proceeded to outline the responsibilities that the city has accepted, presenting them as follows:

1. The responsibility of providing a suitable environment to contribute to the training the school hopes to give an environment that will give parents of students complete confidence. This will be in the form of a school building, and the city has accepted, presenting them as follows:

2. The responsibility of providing adequate training facilities for the students. This is the very essence of normal school training of prospective teachers, he pointed out.

Discusses Publicity
3. The responsibility of providing a proper publicity to reach over the state, particularly the part served. He said that by this he means definite information regarding the school and the conditions in the community.

"I am very glad La Grande has accepted responsibility along these lines," Mr. Inlow said, adding that he was sure that it would be fulfilled.

A bulletin concerning the Eastern Oregon Normal school is now being prepared and will be given general distribution in the near future. It will go to every senior in Eastern Oregon high schools and will be available to high school graduates elsewhere in the state, he said. The bulletin will include information about the school, the classes, courses, admission fees, etc.

Congressional Leaders Inclined to Smother Reduction Hints

EXPECT HUNDRED
MILLION SURPLUS

Chairman Smoot, of Senate Finance Committee, Declares This Is Not Sufficient

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Gratified over the prospects of a \$100,000,000 treasury surplus this year, congressional leaders nevertheless today were inclined to smother suggestions for another tax reduction.

Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee declared the \$100,000,000 margin was not sufficient to begin a new tax reduction measure. He declared that appropriations authorized by congress at the last session would almost consume this prospective surplus.

Mentions Gravity Law
"Moreover," he said, "most of the profits going to make up the increased taxes received this year by the government were made from a rising stock market. What goes up is apt to come down. We face the prospect of having taxpayers deduct losses if there should be a declining stock market. The government cannot gamble on such a contingency."

Senator Smoot agrees with Secretary Mellon that if another tax revision is made attention should be given to a cut in the rate on earned income. But he does not want even this tax revision considered at this time.

Depends on Business
The Utah senator, an administration financial expert, does not believe tax revision can be considered at the next regular session, beginning in December. Future revision, he said, might depend upon increased business in the country. He saw no opportunity for reductions in government expenditures.

Farm Surplus Of
World Cause Of
Distress, Claim

President of North Dakota Agricultural College Testifies at House Relief Hearing

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2 (AP)—The farm surplus of the world rather than that of the United States is causing distress to the farmers of this country, G. L. Coulter, president of the state agricultural college of North Dakota, told the house agriculture committee today in testimony on the new farm bill.

Crops produced in other countries where lands and labor were cheap, he said, were driving American products from the markets and leaving the American farmer with a surplus on his hands.

Substitutes Dangerous
They come into this country largely in the form of substitutes, he added, explaining that imported molasses used in the manufacture of industrial alcohol was displacing American corn, while starch imports left growers in this country with potatoes to throw away.

He urged that the problem be dealt with by tariff revision to preserve the domestic market for American producers and suggested that members of the agriculture committee present the case to the ways and means committee.

Favors Farm Board
Coulter favored creation of a farm board to aid the farmer in balancing production and demand. Stabilization corporations also would be valuable, he said, but he disagreed with suggestions that they should be controlled by the government instead of by the farmers.

Coulter said that in anticipation of the enactment of farm relief legislation that would be effective, plans already were being made to increase the acreage in production during the coming season.

Mrs. Medill McCormick, newly-elected representative from Illinois, has "plenty of legislation" that she is planning to introduce during the regular session of the seventy-first congress.

Refusing to discuss any further the bills that she will bring up and fight for, she declared that her present fight will be to keep the special session, which will open April 15, "pure" for farm relief and tariff.

This daughter of Mark Hanna and widow of Senator Medill McCormick, asserted that she is a farmer's representative and will take her part in the debate on the floor of the house in any effort necessary to keep the session closed to consideration of anything except the two major problems.

DROPS BOMBS
ON U. S. LAND

Ferry Baker, 35, Wounded in Head Early Today at Naco, Arizona

WINDOWS BROKEN
IN BUSINESS AREA

Explosions Result When Insurgents Bombard Naco, Sonora from Air, Two Missiles Go Wild

NACO, ARIZ., Apr. 2 (AP)—Ferry Baker, 35, of Alliance, Ohio, was wounded in the head by flying fragments of one of two rebel bombs which fell on the United States side of the international line here early today during an air raid by a Mexican rebel aviator on the federal fortifications across the border in Naco, Sonora.

Baker was immediately placed under treatment of a physician at the U. S. immigration office, but the extent of his injuries was not disclosed. There was also an unverified report that a boy was hurt during the attack but he had not been located in the confusion which followed.

Windows Shattered
Four missiles were hurled, one of which shattered every window in the business section of Naco, Ariz., sending the terror-stricken populace in a hurried scramble from the danger zone. The other two bombs fell across the line. The extent of their damage was not determined. Major Charles B. Hazeltine, in charge of American troops here, declined to comment on the situation.

One of the bombs falling on this side struck 114 feet from the line and a few yards from the United States customs house. The other hit 158 feet inside the boundary and near a group of Americans watching rebel activities through field glasses.

The man hurt was a motion picture cameraman's helper.

Suggest Talk
General Frank R. Cocheu, area commander from El Paso, is on his way to Naco from El Paso, where he will confer with Major Hazeltine, who said he would suggest that they go to General Fausto Topete's rebel camp and talk over the matter if it met with the approval of General Cocheu.

Company M of the 25th Infantry were just entering Naco, Ariz., for their regular drill when the bombs fell. After the excitement had subsided they were returned to their camp a short distance from town.

TO TAKE PRECAUTIONS

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2 (AP)—Dropping of bombs in Naco, Ariz., today by Mexican rebel fliers is expected to result in additional precautions being taken by the American government to prevent repetition of such an incident.

The state department, in the absence of any official report of the bombing, indicated that Major General William Lassiter, commander of the 8th Corps area of the army at San Antonio, would take steps, probably ordering some units of the army air corps from one of the Texas air fields to Naco.

General Lassiter has full authority.

FLIERS MISSING

Captain Kingsford-Smith and Three Companions Lost in Australia

LONDON, Apr. 2 (AP)—A dispatch to the Evening News from Melbourne, Australia, today said that anxiety for Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and his three companions of the Southern Cross was becoming acute.

Reports that they had landed safely near the Drysdale mission station could not be confirmed and fears were expressed that the air men before sending out their final messages may have lost their way and headed toward Darwin, where the heavy rain would have made a safe landing almost impossible.

Colonel Brinsmead, controller of civil aviation, who believes that Port George was the probable landing place, says that the country there is very rough and as bad as anything in the whole of Australia with very few settlers in the district.

The dispatch says a rescue plane which was sent out yesterday took the wrong route and was almost certain to miss the lost aviators, who disappeared Sunday while enroute from Sydney to Wyndham, West Australia, as part of a flight to England.

It was believed that unless the Southern Cross landed near settlers their small supply of food must have become exhausted. The country is roadless and without even so much as tracks. Moreover, Captain Kingsford-Smith had not quite recovered from an attack of influenza and told his cousin when he was about to start that he was a very sick man.

WALLA WALLA
MAN ADMITS HE
KILLED WIFE

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 2 (AP)—George Schneider, 39, having admitted attacking his young wife, Betty, 34, with a meat axe Sunday night, literally backing her to death, officials decided no inquest would be held. Overcome with grief when informed his wife was dead, Schneider gave a complete statement of facts surrounding the murder to Prosecuting Attorney W. G. Galsman. Schneider admitted he became enraged when his wife indicated her intention of going down town in response to a telephone call which he believed was a summons to meet an old sweetheart. While she was getting ready to go, Schneider said he obtained a meat cleaver and after calling her into the dining room, began hacking at her. He thought at first he had killed her outright, but upon discovering she was still alive, he called a physician.

Schneider has asked for a lawyer to defend him.

Deputy Sheriff
Who Shot Woman
Testifies Today

Roy Smith Declares Mrs. Lillian Deking Leveled Gun at Him During Aurora Raid

GENEVA, Ill., April 2 (AP)—A coroner's jury today recommended that Roy Smith, deputy sheriff who shot and killed Mrs. Lillian Deking during a raid on her Aurora home, be held to the grand jury for investigation. The jury termed the shooting of the woman "unnecessary" and the warrant on which the raid was made "illegal."

GENEVA, Ill., Apr. 2 (AP)—Gen. Smith, 12-year-old son of Mrs. Lillian Deking, who was shot last week by county prohibition raiders, today told a coroner's jury his mother was sitting at a telephone trying to summon help when a deputy sheriff killed her, thus disputing the story of the deputy earlier that the woman was aiming a pistol at him when he fired accidentally as he stumbled.

The coroner's jury came here from Aurora to take Smith's testimony in a hospital where he is convalescing. After hearing his story they went to Geneva where the formal inquest was opened.

Only the jury and attorneys and one reporter could crowd into the small hospital room where Smith lay. By previous agreement the coroner conducted the questioning. George Carberry, Kane county state's attorney, and Deking's counsel agreeing not to intervene, and Charles Hadley, observer for the attorney general, stating he did not care to ask questions.

Identified Pistol
Smith first identified a pistol he carried last week when Joseph Deking's Aurora home was raided by county officers, and also another pistol that he thought Mrs. Deking picked up from the floor. He said he and two other deputies accompanied two officers to the Deking home after the two officers had been unable to gain entrance to search it.

He said they found the house lighted and he had understood that "everything was all right and that Peter Deking, Joseph's brother and a deputy were inside." He said he entered by the front door after the house was surrounded and did not anticipate trouble. He noticed a boy and then saw a man backing toward him pistol in hand, shouting he intended to shoot the first officer to enter.

Says Woman Rushed Him
Smith said he then realized he was the only officer in the house and decided it were best to knock out the armed man which he said he did with the butt of his pistol. As this man, identified as Deking, fell, Smith said he heard a woman scream although he had understood Mrs. Deking was not in the house. The woman rushed toward him, screaming, he declared, snatched

French Cruiser

PARIS, Apr. 2 (AP)—Frenchmen passing the bier of Ambassador Herrick signed the register at the American embassy today at the rate of 10 a minute. Thousands added their names to those of other thousands who came yesterday to pay their last respects to the American envoy.

The file comprised the most humble and France's most distinguished and aristocratic. A cardinal and ambassadors were among them. Also a former president of the council and representatives of French royalty. But the mass of visitors were just plain French people, unknown personally to the ambassador's family or those at the embassy.

The ambassador's official family bade him farewell this morning.

The ambassador's body will be taken aboard the Tourville, newest and fastest cruiser in the French navy, at Brest, where the vessel now is lying, at a time to be determined later in accordance with the wishes of the family.

Orders Casket And
Then Kills Himself

NEW ORLEANS, La., (AP)—In the best of spirits, Vito Longo, 55, visited a Canal street undertaking shop, purchased a high priced casket, drove to the cemetery to ascertain that the dimensions would fit the tomb, and returned to the mortuary to take his life.

WIND STORM
TAKES TOLL
IN 13 STATES

Eight Persons Dead and Several Score Injured, Check Reveals

PROPERTY DAMAGE
IN THE MILLIONS

Fifty School Children Endangered in Pennsylvania; Storms Lash the Great Lakes District

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—The death toll from a furious wind storm that swept across 13 states and part of Canada yesterday mounted to eight today. Several score persons were hurt. There was much property damage.

The storm, which reached a velocity of 70 miles an hour at some places, originated in the southwest, tearing across parts of Arkansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin and upper Michigan and then across Ohio into Pennsylvania, West Virginia, New York and New Jersey.

Buildings were unroofed, wires were blown down and trees uprooted.

Lake Fronts Damaged
On Lake Michigan and Lake Erie were away by the storm and much property was damaged along the lake fronts. Waves as high as 25 feet dashed along the Illinois-Wisconsin shore on Lake Michigan.

At Buffalo three ships were torn from their moorings and the Lake Erie water level was six feet above normal.

One man was killed in Buffalo by a falling tree. The wind blew down a hangar at the Buffalo airport, damaging planes.

Centerville, N. Y., was hard hit and cities and towns were cut off from communications by blocked highways and crippled telephone service.

Children Endangered
In a heavy township near Beaver Falls, Pa., a 10-year-old girl was killed and 50 other children endangered when the wind blew off part of the roof of a school building. A 10-year-old girl lost her life in a similar happening at a school building at Newell, W. Va., and a year-old child was killed at Welch, W. Va., when a home was wrecked.

The storm cut a path four miles wide along the Delaware river in Eastern Pennsylvania and New Jersey, causing one death. Boyd Titman, a Portville, N. J., farmer, was killed in the collapse of his home. The storm was most furious in the vicinity of Portland, Pa., and Columbia, N. J., tearing houses and barns from their foundations and unroofing scores of others. Two automobiles on the Timon farm were twisted into wreckage and blown more than 50 yards.

Two Dead in Ohio
Two persons were killed in Ohio. At Newark, a man lost his life when his automobile was struck by a tree, and at Belmore a girl was blown into the path of an automobile and killed. A girl was killed in Arkansas by a falling tree.

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MORGAN, OHIO,
IS UPHELD IN
LIQUOR CASE

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—United States Attorney Charles Tuttle after investigating reports that Congressman William M. Morgan of Ohio had brought four bottles of liquor into the country from Panama, announced today that no automobiles on the Timon farm were twisted into wreckage and blown more than 50 yards.

When first reports were published that the congressman had acknowledged possession of four bottles of liquor found in one of his trunks, but had demanded and been granted free entry, he emphatically denied the whole story. He said he had never had a drink in his life.

Tuttle called seven customs men to his office, including the two inspectors who were reported to have seen the liquor, and after questioning them announced today that the whole matter resolved itself into a "talk between customs men and Mr. Morgan."

He said that not only had no liquor been seen but that none of the congressman's baggage had been opened. He said that this country was extended on the congressman's assertion that he has been in Panama on official business and so was entitled to free entry.
