John Hopkins Head Sums Up The Advances of Last Quarter Century

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP)—The "great advances that have been made in our knowledge" and the widespread application of that knowledge to every day life have made the last quarter-century especially memorable years, in the opinion of Frank J. Goodnow, president of Johns Hopkins university.

"During this period," he points out in his annual commemorative day address, "great strides have been made in the practical applications of science. The use of the internal combustion engine, both in transportation and industry, dates from the beginning of the present century. During that time we may notice, also, very great extension in the use of the telephone, and the beginnings of the science and art of aviation.

"The discovery and application of wireless communication, which has resulted in the present almost universal use of the radio are also to be placed in this quarter of a century.

"The internal combustion engine, the telephone, the airplane, and the radio have done much to change the situation in which we live and are destined with probably increasing force to modify our life.
