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MENUS

My Sister Mary
Here are a few additional hints for sanitary food protection and to eliminate the danger of health risks through food contamination: Dishes and glassware should be washed in sudsy water as hot as the dishwasher can stand and rinsed in scalding water. Glassware will stand very hot water if it is placed in a pan and hot water poured into the pan, but not on the glass, until the glass is covered. An excellent way to rinse the silver is to put it from washing into a colander placed in a larger pan. Pour boiling water over the silver. Lift colander from the pan and polish the silver on a clean towel. The silver will look blurry if it isn't wiped.

Graham Muffins
One cup graham flour, 1 cup white flour, 3 tablespoons granulated sugar, 4 tablespoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons melted butter or shortening. Mix and sift white flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add graham flour and mix thoroughly. Beat egg until light, add milk and melted fat. Add to dry mixture and stir vigorously until blended. Turn into oiled muffin tins and bake in a hot oven for 25 minutes. One of the secrets of good muffins lies in not overheating the dough when blending the wet and dry ingredients. Stir enough to blend, but not enough to make smooth.

All fruits and vegetables that are to be served raw should be thoroughly washed through many clean waters. The ideal way to wash leaf vegetables is under running water with the leaf held at a sharp angle.

Meat should be removed at once from the wrapping paper when it comes from the market and immediately placed in the icebox. Keep in mind that chopped meat does not keep well, so hamburger steak and fresh sausage should be used as soon as purchased.

Eggs should be washed when purchased if there is any trace of dirt on the shell. Egg shells are porous and should be clean.

ELGIN HIGH TO TAKE PART IN K.S.T. CONTEST

EMPORIA, Kan., Apr. 4.—All pupils of Elgin high school will compete in the largest scholarship contest in the world Apr. 10, when more than 250,000 high school pupils throughout the United States will participate in the Every Pupil Scholarship contest, sponsored by the Kansas State Teachers' college at Emporia.

R. E. Arant, superintendent, has ordered 222 tests and record forms which will be used in the contest. The Every Pupil contest does not limit competition to a select few, but affords every pupil an opportunity to participate. The tests will be administered to pupils in chemistry, general science, physics, first year algebra, plane geometry, American history, first year Latin, second year Latin.
