

Big Investments Made In Oregon By New Settlers

PORTLAND (Special)—Heavy investments in Oregon farm and business properties by new settlers have been made recently, according to the state chamber of commerce, which reported a sale of 192 acres near Monroe to Walter H. Cate from Iriliana, Alberta, for \$28,000. Other members of this family have made arrangements to buy a hardware business and will return and locate permanently.

After communicating with the state chamber for some time, D. E. Garwood, South, N. D., came to Oregon and purchased 160 acres near Shedd for \$12,000 cash. C. E. Lusher, Calgary, Alberta, representing several families who have decided to come to Oregon, recently purchased 49 acres from C. F. Hyde of Eugene for R. G. Sanford, Casade, Idaho, paying \$6,500.

In Southern Oregon river and lake frontage has been going into the hands of wealthy Californians who are making heavy investments in summer homes, others making permanent homes in the district. J. Fred Bowls, San Francisco, last month purchased acreage near Trail on the Crater Lake highway and will erect a \$15,000 summer home. One Grants Pass realtor sold three such tracts along the Rogue river in one week recently. South of Ashland on the Pacific highway a large number of California people have secured five and 10-acre tracts and the city will extend its water mains to their homes. During the month of February realtors in Grants Pass reported 34 sales to new families and the chamber of commerce estimates at least 10 more sales were made by owners direct to new folks.

Sales are also reported in Eastern Oregon. Jacob Weinhardt, Dayton, Wash., recently purchased 89 acres from W. H. Boyd in the Lower valley district in Walla Walla county, paying \$125 per acre cash. W. T. Dougherty in the same district added 40 acres to his holdings. Ernest W. Conrad, Los Angeles, purchased an 80-acre dairy farm near Nyssa, paying cash, and stated alfalfa hay was \$20 per ton in Southern California.

HEROES ARE MADE—NOT BORN.

By Williams THIRD PERSON SUSPECTED IN CHICAGO CASE

CHICAGO, April 4—(AP)—What at first appeared to be an attempted murder followed by suicide had turned today into a mystery in which a third person may have played a murderer's part.

Two aged women—a wealthy widow and her maid—were found in the former's apartment yesterday. The maid, Mrs. Ida Peterson, was dead, a broad knife plunged in her neck; her mistress, Mrs. Helen Kelso, 70, was near death from hammer blows.

The first theory of police was that the maid, 67 years old, had beaten Mrs. Kelso over the head with a hammer and then had taken her own life.

Circumstances tending to contradict the murder-suicide theory were found by investigators for the coroner's office. Physicians expressed doubt that the maid would have sufficient strength to have plunged the knife into her neck with such force as to break off part of the blade. They also deduced from the blood that flowed from both that Mrs. Kelso may have been attacked after the maid had been slain.
