## Eggs Continue To Dip Up And Down in Market

PORTLAND, Ore., April 5 (AP)—Keeping up with egg values, as they slide up or down from day to day, has come to be quite a pastime with those interested in markets. One day all is lovely and the next morning finds the bottom knocked out of the top lifted to accommodate higher prices.

Eggs were again down today apparently for the same reason that they were up Thursday. At any rate, standard extras have declined two cents to 25, standard firsts one cent and a half to 25, and medium firsts one cent to 21. Eggs are plentiful, but no one can tell what will happen to the price between now and Saturday. The cooperatives and the independents are all eyeing each other, but whether with admiration or vengeance remains to be seen.

## Wheat Irregular In Chicago Market

CHICAGO, April 5 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1/2 off Chicago wheat rallied somewhat, but then underwent a general sag. Corn, oats and provisions also were easy, with corn starting at 1/2 decline to 1/2 advance and subsequently receding all around.

Wheat, closed irregular, ranging from 1/2 net decline to 1/2 advance, corn unchanged to a shade lower, oats unchanged to 1/2 up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/2.

NEW YORK, April 5 (AP)—Frequent shifts of speculative sentiment in today's stock market reflected the widespread uneasiness still existing over the credit situation. Reactionary tendencies predominated at the opening as a result of a rather heavy liquidation by nervous investors and speculators who were alarmed at the threat contained in the Federal Reserve Board statement published this morning but these offerings were readily absorbed, and the market showed a tendency to rally when the call money rate was lowered from 8 to 6 per cent.
