Students Urge Enoch Bagshaw To Resign Post

SEATTLE, Apr. 6 (AP)—Enoch Bagshaw, stern center of prolonged discussion between athletes and student leaders at the University of Washington was today considering an invitation to resign as head football coach and receive in return the \$74,000 due him under the remaining three years of his contract.

He was urged to leave his post by the student board of control last night after his second attempt to remove him had been declared illegal by a special committee of deans acting in behalf of President Lyle Spencer.

His continuance, the resolution said, will cause dissension among the students and alumni, will create a feeling of instability which cannot but be a weakening influence upon the spirit of those who turn out for football, will tend to cause controversies which will embarrass the administration of the university, will cause unfavorable comment upon the part of the general public and will invite criticism of himself for insisting in remaining in a position where his services are no longer desired.

Bagshaw, who was once a star halfback under Gil Doble, has coached Husky teams for eight years.

JOHNNY RISKO WINS BATTLE LAST EVENING

BOSTON, April 6 (AP)—Johnny Risko, the trial-horse of the heavy-weight division, has tested Otto Von Porat, late of Norway, and found him wanting as a serious contender for championship honors.

Johnny broke his losing streak here last night by administering a 10-round beating to Otto. Risko carried the honors in every round and his rugged, lightning-fighting prevented Von Porat from doing much with his right hand, reputed to be a terrific weapon.

Both batters weighed 192 pounds.

Von Porat was only able to jab Risko weakly with his right and his only telling punch was launched in the sixth round, when he landed hard on the side of Johnny's head.

The blow staggered Risko but the Norwegian refused to become aggressive, thereby permitting Risko to slash his way back and flay away with both hands to the body.

George Stager Elected Captain Of Oregon Team

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 6—George A. Stager, La Grande, senior in education, was elected captain of the 1929 Webfoot track team at a meeting of the lettermen, held at Hayward field, here this week.

Stager is a two-year letterman, participating in the discus and javelin throws. He is counted on as a mainstay in the weight events for this year's team, and Coach Hill Hayward reported he was well pleased with the choice of the lettermen.

Aspirants for the field events were taken in hand by Coach Hayward this week and given individual instruction in their respective events. Bill Crawford, who earned his second track sweater in the few hurdles last year, is again turning his attention to the high jump.

Starred in Prep School Crawford was a star jumper on the yearling team during his freshman year, and broke the interscholastic record while outsparring for Jefferson high, in Portland. Ed Mueller put in the afternoon loosening up his leg muscles, jumping for two hours. This versatile track star plans to compete in the high jump as well as in the weight events and javelin throws.

Hill Leads Miles The variety miles, led by Ralph Hill, worked out by running four laps and, after jogging around a while, topped off the day with a fast half mile. Clarence Hill, who suffered a broken leg in the annual O. A. C. cross country run last fall, is again registered in school and reports his leg totally healed. He is expected to materially strengthen the Webfoot team in the distance events.

An interesting feature of the practice session was the work of Hubert Allen, colored star from Pendleton. This freshman whose work was the sensation of the Eastern Oregon interscholastic meet a year or two ago, bids fair to become a great all-around trackman. He runs the dashes, hurdles, broad jumps, and high jumps with equal ability. His form in the high jump is exceptional for a man of his small stature.

George Stager, new Oregon track captain, was one of the stars of the Tiger track and field team before he graduated at La Grande High school. When in the blue and white colors, Stager consistently scored points in the discus, leaving the platter more than 100 feet in his high school days. Later, in college, he added more than 20 feet to his previous performances, occasionally getting away with an even longer throw.

The selection of Stager was regarded in La Grande as being a signal honor and indicative of the high regard in which the former Tiger athlete is held at the college. Last year Stager was first in the discus in the Pacific coast conference track meet.

It is said locally that this is the second time La Grande has had a track captain in any college. In 1915 Lee Freeman was captain of the Oregon State track team.

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Reigh Count Is Eleventh; Square Rock Home First

LINGFIELD, Eng., Apr. 6 (AP)—Square Rock, by Rock Point out of Quartette, today won the Lingfield handicap of a mile and a quarter over a field including the famous American colt Reigh Count.
