Big Potatoes to be Baked—South McKennon, potato king of the Grande Ronde valley, brought in two sacks of potatoes today which he has given to the Sacajawea Inn with the stipulation that they be baked and served for the banquet of the Union County Development league next Tuesday night. There are 75 potatoes in both sacks, 35 and a half to each sack. They weigh two and a half pounds each and are the size of small watermelons.

SHOT DURING ROBBERY

CHICAGO, Apr. 10 (AP)—The son of a plain police sergeant who was killed by bandit bullets 10 years ago, today was in turn shot and probably fatally wounded by a deputy marshal during a robbery. Surprising bandits in the act of robbing a truck driver, Deputy United States Marshal Palmer Larson shot Hugh Burns through the head and himself received a bullet through the hip. The wounded bandit was the son of the late Police Sergeant George Burns.

Figure in Aimee Case Is Located, Newspaper Says

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 10 (AP)—The Examiner in a copy-righted story today announces that it had located Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Sielaff, one of the figures in the Aimee Temple McPherson kidnapping investigation, in Seattle.

Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff, who has been sought as an important witness in the impeachment trial of Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy of Los Angeles, was quoted as saying she would go to Sacramento at once and volunteer to take the stand for the prosecution.

The newspaper says Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff made an affidavit declaring Judge Hardy had asked her if she could produce a woman known as "Miss X" in the McPherson case and that she (Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff) agreed to do so.

Judge Hardy is accused of committing judicial misdemeanors in acting in behalf of Mrs. McPherson while her kidnapping story was under fire. The affidavit as set forth in the Examiner says Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff agreed to produce a woman who would "act" being the companion of Kenneth G. Ormiston, Angelus Temple radio operator, at Carmel, Cal., nearly three years ago.

This was during Mrs. McPherson's mysterious absence from Angelus Temple. Upon her return she declared that she had been kidnapped and had escaped. The Los Angeles district attorney's office charged the evangelist and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, with conspiracy to obstruct justice as the result of Mrs. McPherson's story before the grand jury. The charge later was dropped.

The newspaper quoted Mrs. Wiseman-Sielaff as saying she met Mrs. McPherson, Mrs. Kennedy and Judge Hardy at various times in arranging to carry out the "Miss X" agreement.

CUTS THROAT TO GET BREAD CHOKING HIM

COPENHAGEN, April 10 (AP)—Anders Hanson, elderly mechanic, cut his own throat to save his life today. Hanson was found with a gaping wound in his throat and taken to a hospital. When he had been treated and was able to tell the story, he related that he had swallowed a piece of bread crust the wrong way and was choking to death.

He decided that he must apply heroic remedies and drawing his pocket knife made an incision right under the spot where he felt the bulging crust to give himself air. The surgery saved his life but physicians congratulated him on his luck in avoiding big arteries in the throat and said they would not recommend his method for general use.

COMPANION OF MRS. LEWIS IS NOT LOCATED

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 10 (AP)—The Los Angeles sheriff's office was informed by Brawley, Cal., police today that Mrs. Ruth Jackson, mentioned as a companion of Mrs. Mabel Lewis, missing Compton, Cal., woman, has disappeared from her home at Brawley.

Mrs. Jackson was described by Clifford Lewis, husband of the missing woman and held by Salt Lake City police, as an acquaintance of his wife who planned to drive with her to the home of Mrs. Lewis' mother, Mrs. John Blanton, of Colorado Springs, Colo., and has not been seen since. He expressed fear that his wife might have been slain; that the torso found in the Los Angeles river last Thursday was hers.

Brawley police said that Mrs. Jackson's mother informed them of her daughter's disappearance. Further efforts of Brawley authorities to check the presence of Lewis there on a report that he had lived in the Imperial valley city were futile.
