SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 11.—(AP)—It was home run day in the past league yesterday, three teams winning a circuit clout, and a fourth taking a victory on pitching merits.

At Portland the Beavers made it two straight in their home park by defeating Hollywood again 3 to 2. Two home runs by Charley Bates, who went from center field to catch

The San Francisco Missions won the second game of the series with Seattle 3 to 2 in the northern metropolis. With the score tied 2-0, Eddie Mulligan sent a scorching double down the third base line,

which scored Christensen in the eighth inning. It was a pitchers' battle all the way through, Seattle using three twirlers, and the Reds sending in two. Andy House shouldered the blame for the defeat, having proved too lenient to the only two men he served from the mound. He walked the first, and permitted the second to single. Los Angeles Fighter Wins Amateur Belt
BOSTON, Apr. 11.—(AP)—New England today had half of the eight national amateur boxing champions of 1929 within her borders and the others were well scattered about the country. Grand Rapids, Mich., providing two and Buffalo, N. Y., and Los Angeles one each.
Steve Halmka, of Buffalo, won the 135 pounds crown for the second consecutive time.
The other seven title-winners, with possibly one exception, probably would have returned home defeated this year if the 1928 champions, most of whom fought for the American Olympic team at Amsterdam, had been able to disregard the purse-stirring call of the professional ring.

The possible exception was Martin Zuziga, of Los Angeles, who won the 126-pound title. This youth, a clever two-fisted battler, gained the final round in the 1928 tournament, which served as the Olympic tryouts, but drew the wrong end of a decision.

Wrestling fans were treated to another of the wild rough wrestling matches characterizing that sport so often this season, when Bob Kruse, Lake Oswego farmer, took two out of three falls from George Walker, Canadian heavyweight champion, here last night. Kicking, hitting, slugging and tossing each other over the ropes were a few of the practices indulged in. Kruse took the first fall in 39 minutes, 5 seconds with a series of flying wristlocks. Walker came

back nine minutes later to smother Kruse with the crab or double stepover toe hold and nearly finished Kruse when he refused to let go after Kruse had given up. They had been wrestling less than a minute in the final session when Walker again started the profane, leary moves for another crab hold when Kruse reached down, grabbed one of Walker's feet and suddenly shot him over backwards. Before Walker could move, Kruse was upon him and held him for the fall.
