Marie Prevost In "Godless Girl" At the Arcade

Hard-boiled, sophisticated as only Youth can be, with a sense of humor and deeply religious. Such is the interesting character portrayed by Marie Prevost in "The Godless Girl," Cecil B. De Mille's production for Pathe which is now on view at the Arcade.

This type of portrayal is a decided departure from the characterizations Miss Prevost has essayed. Such pictures as "Up in Mabel's Room," "Getting Gertie's Garter," "The Girl in the Pulpit," "The Night Bride" and "A Blonde for a Night" established her as a favorite in farce-comedy, professionally. Miss Prevost welcomed the opportunity offered by Cecil De Mille of appearing as a reform school inmate in "The Godless Girl."

Lina Rasquette, George Duryea, Noah Beery, Eddie Quillan and Kate Price are prominently cast in "The Godless Girl" which De Mille personally directed for Pathe.

"The Apache" Founded On Life Of French Youth

Ramon Romero, author of Columbia's "The Apache," which is coming to the Star theater on Saturday, has resided in the Latin Quarter of Paris for a number of years. During that time he has made a study of the many quaint and unusual characters that frequent that section of the French city. He has cultivated their acquaintance, learned their life histories and mastered their mannerisms and habits.

On one of his excursions to the Paris underworld Romero made the acquaintance of a youth, whose clean-cut face and marked dancing ability made him an outstanding figure in the motley crew. A friendship sprang up between the two and gradually Romero obtained the youth's story, which when spliced together furnished the skeleton of "The Apache."

Every incident in the photodrama is based upon an actual event in the Parisian underworld, an occurrence which came within the personal observation of Romero. The detailed description of the characters, scenes, mannerisms and habits which accompanied the script made it possible for Director Phil Rosen, who is also familiar with the highways and byways of France, to reconstruct the episodes as perfectly as though the picture were made upon the actual scene.

Margaret Livingston was chosen

as Sonya, the heroine, because she closely resembled the girl around whom Romero had woven his story. Likewise, Don Alvarado was almost a perfect double for the youth, whose story so fascinated the author that he created "The Apache." Similarly Warner Richmond, Phil McCullough and Edna Mae Cooper were selected for the cast.
