## MENUS

Most of us use dandelion greens early in the spring as commonly as we do spinach, but there are many other friendly weeds that are delicious and healthful, being nature's own tonic.

The American cowslip or marsh-marigold which grows in the meadows and fields is succulent and tender if gathered before the blossoms have formed. This green is likely to be slightly bitter and tough if used when it has matured.

Sour dock comes early before garden greens are plentiful and many people think it rivals kale or spinach when properly cooked. Many men who refuse to eat spinach like the edible weeds probably because of their peculiar tang.

Fernbrakes if culled while curled as they come up from the earth make a delicious green vegetable. Green, no matter what kind it may be, is rich in sulphur and ideal for a springtime "tonic." Wild mustard resembles the leaf of the spinach except that it is more ragged in outline. Purslane, or "pussley" as we call it when it over-

runs our gardens, is good cooked as a green, in a stew or cream soup.

Extreme care must be taken in looking over greens. A good salt water bath is essential and a thorough rinsing under running water insures perfect cleanliness.

All these wild greens are rich in mineral salts and vitamins and are well worth recognition by every housewife.

Cream of sorrel soup is a recipe the English borrowed from the French. It is rich and nourishing and would make an excellent luncheon soup.

One cup minced sorrel, 2 table-  
spoons butter, 1 teaspoon sugar,  
few grains nutmeg, 1 teaspoon  
salt, 2 cups chicken or veal stock,  
½ cup rich milk or cream, 1 cup  
white sauce, yolks of 2 eggs.

Wash sorrel and strip leaves  
from stem. Mince and measure  
leaves. Melt butter and add sorrel.  
Cook five minutes, stirring to pre-  
vent burning. Add stock and let  
simmer 20 minutes. Add white  
sauce, salt, sugar, pepper, nutmeg,  
and let cook a few minutes longer.  
Beat yolks of eggs with cream  
and stir into the hot soup. Cook  
just long enough to cook the eggs  
but do not let boil. Serve at once  
with croutons.

## Jewel Colors Lead For Evening Wraps

PARIS (AP)—One ruby or emerald or even a good big garnet can be made to do a lot of work under this season's system of matching evening wraps to jewelry and setting both off against a white gown.

It is the jewelry of madame—if any—that decides what color evening wrap she will wear over her white gown.

Influential fashion makers are insisting upon the white gown and show more white than any three colors, except black. Lacking jewelry women who dress by the last minute rules are going to wear wraps of the flower shade that is most becoming to them, over white evening dresses or frocks of pale shades in the shades of their wrap.

The simplest, and sometimes the prettiest, of the velvet wraps are unlined. The softest of chiffon velvet is used for them. Unimportant collars or ermine or fox are quite general, although many wraps have no fur trimming. There are pretentious coats and capes of intricate cut with large collars and trimming bands of the most expensive furs, including sable.

The woman who wears jewelry can carry out the scheme of white and bright color in accessories to match her caps, slippers, hand-bags and chiffon handkerchiefs should be assorted to the shade of the velvet wrap.
