 Hitting averages reached new highs for the season in the Pacific coast league, it was evidenced by scores in yesterday's four series games.

Base hits so noticeably lacking in the first two weeks of the season continued to click from the bats of the Stars and the San Francisco club pounded out its fourth straight victory over the Sacramento Senators, 6 to 2. Hollis Thurston, right hander, held the Senators to five scattered hits.

Thurston contributed to his team's winning score by driving out a homer, and a single that resulted in another homer, Johnny Monroe, Sacramento second sacker, hit two home runs for the only tallies of the visitors.

Stars Win in Storm
 Hollywood won, 7 to 1, from the Heavers in Portland in typical Beaver weather. It rained from the third to the eighth inning, and time was called twice for injured players. The wet ball got away from Mahaffey, Portland pitcher, and hit Malone, who was at bat, under the heart. He was led to the bench. Cowboy Tomlin wrenched his ankle while sliding to second base through the mud. Another of Mahaffey's wet cannonball pitches barely missed Pflieger Hulvey on the head.

The Seattle Indians used three twirlers in a vain effort to arm back the San Francisco Mission. Hecks, but dropped the game to the visitors 11 to 9.

 The Indians made a final drive in the ninth inning which netted them four runs, but it wasn't quite enough to win. The Missions drove in three runs in the first of the ninth.

At Los Angeles the Angels won 6 to 1 from the Oakland Ales. Clyde Barfoot won his fourth straight game of the season, and helped the Angels to maintain their hold on first place, by duck pitching, sending over his famous "slow ball". He held the Ales to seven runs, two hits, a couple of scratch hits, together with infield outs, gave them only their sole tally in the fourth inning. Early Webb and "Slug" Tolson rapped out homers with a man on base on each occasion, and Howard (Doc) Robinson thus far four of the Angel runs. The Angels this week took three out of four.

NEW YORK TEAMS PICKED TO WIN

Major League Baseball Diamonds to See Action On April 16

NEW YORK, Apr. 13—(AP)—The threat of another all-New York monopoly of major league baseball's highest laurels stands out in the advance dope for the pennant races that get under way next Tuesday.

It was not so long ago, in 1921-'22-'23, that the world's series was just a subway affair. This trust was broken up and only half of its former partnership—the Yankees—has since operated with any conspicuous success.

This year the Giants again join their fellow townsmen as favorites in the forthcoming championship races, as a result of the official consensus of newspaper experts compiled for the third successive year by the Associated Press.

60 Experts Speak
 The results of this major league poll, grown to record proportions for 1929 with more than sixty experts registering their opinions, disclose the Yankees as overwhelming favorites to win their fourth straight American league pennant and the Giants as the choice over the powerful Chicago Cubs by a narrow margin.

Of the 66 ballots cast on the probable result of the American league contest, 53 pick the Yankees as an overwhelming vote of confidence. Ten others select the Athletics while two name the St. Louis Browns as first choice, and one the Washington Senators.

The Giants prevail over the Cubs by a margin of 33 to 26 in a total vote of 64 on the national league prospects. Of the five others, only three pick the 1928 champions, St. Louis, while two name Pittsburgh as first choice.

The sharp contrast in predictions

is shown by the fact that over 80 per cent of the writers favor the Yankees while slightly more than 50 per cent pick the Giants and 40 per cent the Cubs. It will be a disheartening shock to the dope if any contender outside of this trio breaks through to win.

Predicted Orders of Finish
 Here are the predicted orders of finish in the two leagues on the basis of the consensus:

American league—New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Detroit, Washington, Cleveland, Chicago and Boston.

National league—New York, Chicago, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Brooklyn, Philadelphia and Boston.

The three-year record of the Associated Press consensus, in which an increasing number of newspaper critics have co-operated annually, reveals the experts battling on the bright side of the 500 mark. They picked the Pirates successfully, on the basis of pre-season dope in 1927, the Yankees in 1928 and came close enough on the others to fortify their records. The Yankees of 1927 were second choice to beat out the highly favored Athletics. In 1928, the first-choice Pirates upset calculations by skidding down to fourth position in a long-race race but the St. Louis Cardinals, a robust second choice, came through to justify a lot of opinion in their favor.

The only other serious upset to the previous consensus verdict was furnished by the 1925 edition of the Browns, who astonished even their most ardent supporters by finishing third when they had been generally picked to do no better than seventh. Six of the sixteen clubs finished the 1928 race exactly as it had been predicted they would before the races started.

UNCLE BILLY PINS WOODS
 MEDFORD, Ore., Apr. 13—(AP)—Billy Edwards, Kansas City wrestler, won two out of three falls in his match here last night with Sallor Jack Woods of Medford. It was a rough fracas with kicking and biting punctuating the more orthodox grappling. Edwards won the deciding fall with a knuckle headlock.

Great Fight In New York Ends With Foul Blow

NEW YORK, Apr. 13—(AP)—The question of bantamweight supremacy, a complicated problem since the night two years ago when Charley Phil Rosenberg forfeited his title on the weighing-in scales, has no nearer settlement than ever today but New York fans at least had one gala night to look back upon as a part of the arguments.

Some 16,000 jammed Jess McMahon's new fabled emporium last night for the fifteen-round struggle of Kid Chocolate, the Cuban sensation, and Husky Graham, wire-haired phantom from Utica, N. Y. They saw a great fight while it lasted, the decision given to Chocolate on a foul in the seventh round.

The big barn-like structure far-up in the Bronx was opened by the former matchmaker at Madison Square Garden. One thousand counterfeited tickets were reported sold and spectators arriving late found their seats already occupied. There was major fighting within the ring, minor battling among the spectators and general squabbling and milling outside.

The fight itself was spectacular while it lasted and ended in disappointing fashion when the tiring Graham, four times warned for low punching, shot a final blow to Chocolate's belt line when on the verge of a knockout in the seventh. There were four clean knock-downs in all.

The "Reed" tumbled from a right to the chin in the first and a low left in the second while Graham was down in the second and seventh. Both fighters came on each time without counts and Graham barely touched the canvas with his finger tips in the sixth. Graham sealed 121½, Chocolate 120.
