sound bones, and vitamin C. Stewed rhubarb is desirable for breakfast in place of orange juice. Care should be taken not to overcook it, for vitamin C disappears if subjected to too great heat for too long a length of time. Vitamin C is in the same one found in orange juice and tomato juice and uncooked cabbage and lettuce and the other green and yellow vegetables.

When rhubarb is combined with other materials greater food value is obtained since those can be chosen to make up its lack. For instance, many cooks add raisins to stewed or baked rhubarb. This adds iron to the dish and increases its efficiency.

The person on a reducing diet will find rhubarb to her liking if too much sugar is not used for sweetening. She will, of course,

not choose any rhubarb dish indiscriminately but select a rhubarb jelly, whip, ice or plain stewed rhubarb.

Rhubarb Betty is good and, if served with a simple liquid sauce, makes a desirable dessert for small children.

Rhubarb Betty
Two cups cut rhubarb, 1/2 cup raisins, 4 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup bread crumbs.
Put half the crumbs into a well buttered baking dish. Add rhubarb and raisins. Sprinkle with sugar and dot with bits of butter.

Former Head of G. A. R. Passes On In Vets Hospital

Duncan L. McKay, 83, of Portland, father of Duncan Lawson McKay, of La Grande, and past commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, department of Oregon, died Thursday afternoon at the Veterans' hospital in Portland.

Mr. McKay was widely known in La Grande as he had visited here. Mr. McKay and son, Donald, both of La Grande, survive him, as well as three other sons, Clyde M. McKay, Bend; Joseph Gordon McKay, Rainier, and Frank Powell McKay, Portland, and two other grandchildren, Duncan and Gordon, of Bend.

Mr. McKay was born in Glasgow, Scotland, Oct. 10, 1845. In 1861 he came to the United States, after a short time enlisting in the 99th New York. He fought throughout the Civil war, spending 15 months in the Andersonville prison.
