Fighting Reported At Shaikabad, India

CALCUTTA, India, Apr. 18.—(AP)—Result of fighting between former King Amanullah and Bacho Bakao at Shaikabad, forty miles from Kabul, capital of Afghanistan, was in doubt today. Reports said severe clashes were under way there between forces of the former king, who hopes to regain his throne, and of Bakao, "waterboy of the north," who took the throne from Amanullah's brother.

There were many killed and wounded and the hospitals at Kabul were said to be crowded.

Reports from Afghanistan by way of Moscow said Amanullah had advanced his troops about 650 miles from Kandahar on the road to Kabul, capturing Katat Giza, which was to become his headquarters. The place is about 200 miles from Kabul.

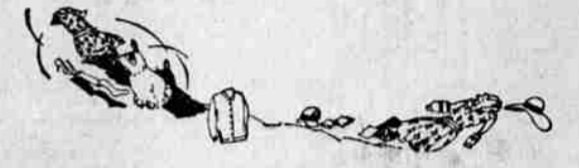
