Informer Killed Near Joliet, Ill.

JOLIET, Ill., April 19 (AP)—Another important though sub rosa figure in the Kianieri kidnapping case of last December has been assassinated in his own dooryard probably, police said, because he "talked too much."

Joseph Perconti, 35, slain by shotgun killers shortly before last midnight, is the man generally believed to have given police information on which they found the kidnapers of 10-year-old Billy Kianieri. He was one of those arrested with the kidnapers, and when the case against him later was dismissed, the understanding was that it was in consideration of information which resulted in the conviction of two men for the abduction.
