Egg And Butter Prices Drop In Portland Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 19 (AP)—Eggs and butter both tobogganed today. Declines ranged from half to one cent on nearly all grades. Standards in butter dropped half a cent to 41 1/2c. Prime firsts and firsts one cent to 41 and 40 1/2c, respectively. There was no change in extras.

Eggs suffered a slash of one cent all down the line. Standard extras went down to 26c, standard firsts to 25c, medium extras to 24c and medium firsts to 23 1/2c.

Poultry and dressed meats were unchanged, with a slight weakening in the price of broilers.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Apr. 19 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "There has been rather more business the last 10 days in wool in consequence of farther price concessions, which have been most pronounced on medium wools. These latter wools are evidently receding to normal price parity with fine wools."

"Further buying of medium clips in Idaho to a limited extent is reported at 32 to 34 cents for medium and 29 to 32c for fine wools, according to the lot."

Wheat Unsettled And Lower Today

CHICAGO, Apr. 19 (AP)—Opening 1/2 to 2 1/2c lower, wheat prices later showed something of a rally. Corn and oats were also weak, corn starting at its decline to 1/2c advance and subsequently continuing to average lower. Provisions held steady.

Wheat closed unsettled at the same as yesterday's finish to 1c lower. Corn varying from 1/2c decline to 3/4c advance, oats 1/2c off to 1/2c up and provisions unchanged to 7c down.
