Braves Take Two
The Braves nosed out the Robins by 6 to 5 in the morning half of the Patriots' day double bill at Boston, and then won in the afternoon by 5 to 1. The mound was occupied in the second game by Dazzy Vance, Uncle Robbie's sole hope for avoiding John Heydler's coal cellar, but the Braves overtook him with a three-run rally in the sixth.

PLAN TO WIPE OUT DEMOCRAT DEBT OF 1928
NEW YORK, April 20 (AP)—Study of plans for wiping out the \$1,300,000 debt of the democratic party will be placed in the hands of a committee to be appointed by national chairman John J. Raskob. This action was decided upon last night at a meeting attended by Alfred E. Smith and Senator Joe T. Robinson, the party's standard bearers in the 1928 presidential campaign, and members of the party's advisory and executive committees.

The party's debt, said Mr. Raskob, had been reduced by \$290,000 through sale of bond volumes of former Governor Smith's campaign addresses and other contributions. Many suggestions have been received on how the debt might best be met and the committee, which he expects to appoint within ten days, will study them all.

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EDUCATORS CONFERRING
SALEM, Ore., Apr. 20 (AP)—A committee appointed by C. A. Howard, state school superintendent, to devise means of improving the work in the small high schools of the state is meeting here today. The committee will prepare a manual and a series of suggested daily programs for the use of the schools. It is said there are 139 high schools in the state of less than 50 students each to which the plan will apply.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 20 (AP)—The state department was advised today that France's instrument of ratification of the Kellogg Treaty to renounce war has reached Washington and will be deposited Monday in the archives of the American government.

The French instrument will be the 14th of the 15 original signatory powers to be received. As soon as it has been filed with the department all of the 15 nations but Japan will have forwarded papers of adherence.

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 20 (AP)—The public service commission Friday sent a letter to City Attorney Frank S. Grant, of Portland, in reply to Grant's suggestion to the commission that it take steps to throw out of the rate base of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company in Oregon the 1 1/2 per cent of gross revenues that the company is said to be paying to the parent American Telephone & Telegraph company for services rendered.

In its letter to Grant the service commission reminds him that in an order 10 years ago it threw out the company's request for an allowance of 4 per cent of gross receipts to be paid the parent company. This it is contended by the commission, is in line with the decision of the Michigan supreme court, cited by Grant, which holds that a 4 per cent payment by the Michigan telephone company to the A. T. & T. is illegal because the latter practically owns the former.

Never Allowed Percentage
The Oregon commission never has allowed as a part of the rate base the 4 per cent then asked by the telephone company for services performed by the company, said Mr. Corey. "It has not allowed any definite per cent," he granted the company by an order made in May, 1919, ten years ago, a charge of 55 cents a telephone, which has year amounted to about \$74,500 on the 176,000 telephones in the state. If the company pays the parent organization more than that, it is its own affair, but it cannot make a charge of more than that in the rate base.

This means the company gets less than 5 cents a telephone a month for the service given by the parent company, a service that we found after exhaustive investigation, was worth that amount to the telephone user. It seems to me that the Michigan decision upholds our decision of ten years ago."
