SALEM, Ore., Apr. 20—A slight decrease in the number of societies under the total shown a year ago, was reported to the annual state convention of the Oregon Christian Endeavor union now in session here by James C. Henderson, president, in his annual report.

The annual census taken in February of this year showed 6 adult, 221 young people's, 150 intermediate and 99 junior societies, a total of 467.

Close to 1200 delegates had registered Friday. Of this number about 350 were from Salem.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 20 (AP)—Consideration of the final report of the resolutions committee was the major task confronting the Daughters of the American Revolution today prior to the installation of their new officers, their annual banquet and adjournment.

In addition, they were called upon to confirm the selections of new state regents and vice regents, and to add to the \$2,000,000 fund being raised for construction of their new constitutional hall, adjoining their memorial continental hall. Previous contributions to the fund had reached a total of \$1,025,000.
