AT THE THEATERS

Corking South Sea Film Coming to Star

Patsy Ruth Miller and Malcolm McGregor are at the Star Theater Sunday in a corking South Sea picture called "Tropical Nights," which the program says was suggested by "A Hail on the Oyster Pirates" by Jack London, and which Elmer Clifton directed. Clifton spent more than a year cruising around the Malaysian archipelago and as a result we have beachcombers, half-castes and other derelicts really resembling the genuine article.

The thrilling experiences of the little actress, stranded in one of those ends-of-the-earth beach towns and subject to the orders of Singapore Joe, the despicable blackguard who runs the Grog Shop, make a thrilling story. Fate links her life with the younger of two brothers and, through his death, with the older brother, and the final clearing up of her troubles is contrived most ingeniously.

Patsy Ruth Miller plays the heroine, an admirable bit of casting. She has brains as well as beauty and brings to the little actress a charming pathos. Malcolm McGregor has the part of the older brother and Ray Haller plays the younger. Their fraternal jollity is nicely done, and the sweetness of their affection lends an additional touch of fatefulness to the story's situations.

McGregor in particular, with his greater opportunity, is seen to excellent advantage. His fine physique being especially impressive in the sooty costume of the pearl fisher.

Wallace McDonald as Stavnow, the boys' partner, whose impulsively agreed projects the dramatic episodes of the story, brings just the right touch of menace to his heavy role. He makes Stavnow as far removed as possible from the irresponsible derelict one might expect, a refreshing change from the customary characterization of such a role.

Robert McWade plays the little actress, the small George M. Cohan, who hears that his millionaire cronies is engaged to marry a Big Town young woman. Bancroft at once assumes that she and her family are hoodwinking his friend, and comes post haste to Manhattan to set things right. Instead, he sets things decidedly wrong, and it is only after much uproarious maneuvering that he straightens out the mix-up he himself has made. Robert McWade marvelously interprets the same part played in the original stage production. Don't fail to see and hear "The Home Towners."

ORDER BARGE LINES
WASHINGTON, Apr. 20 (AP)—Railroads connecting with the Inland Waterways corporation barge line on the Mississippi and Warrior rivers were ordered today by the interstate commerce commission to establish a sweeping system of combination barge-rail and rail-barge rates and routes for the utilization of shippers desiring to combine both water and railroad facilities.

By the terms of the order, which is made effective Aug. 27, a series of rates are to be established ranging down to 20 per cent less than existing all rail rates between the points affected.

Leviathan, With Liquor Supply, Steaming West

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Apr. 20 (AP)—The giant liner Leviathan left for New York this morning with a stock of liquor aboard for sale to passengers.

It was understood there was to be no bar aboard the Leviathan, but that wines and liquors once bought might be served when and where passengers chose.

Ship's officers refused to discuss the quantity of liquor put aboard. The loading was done with the utmost secrecy, officials at the pier refusing to give any information.

It was learned, however, the supply had been estimated so as to have little left over when the liner reaches the 12-mile limit where what is left will be thrown overboard.

The Leviathan carried 247 first class passengers and expected to pick up an equal number at Cherbourg.
