Worn out pasture in the eastern United States may be rejuvenated by top dressing with liberal amounts of manure or some form of phosphoric acid, preferably ad-perphosphate or basic slag, at the rate of 100 pounds to the acre. Sodium nitrate may be applied at the rate of 125 pounds to the acre, and ammonium sulphate at the rate of 100 pounds. Nitrogen fertilizer should be applied in early spring, and the phosphates in the late fall or winter.

REIWOOD CITY, Cal., Apr. 22.—(AP)—One man was killed and eight persons, including a year-old baby, were injured in a collision between two automobiles on the highway near Helmont today.

The dead: Jack Cardin, 30, of San Jose, driver of one car.

The injured: J. E. Cullen, Klamath Falls, Ore., lacerations and bruises.

Richard Cullen, 7, his son, shock and possible spinal injury.

Mrs. J. E. Cullen, his wife, bruises and shock.

Frank Vogel, San Francisco, driver of the second car, back injuries, cuts and bruises.

Mrs. Frank Vogel, his wife, head injuries, lacerations.

Paul Saussele, San Francisco, shock and cuts on face.

Mrs. Paul Saussele, his wife, deep cuts on head and face.

Helen Saussele, their year-old daughter, bruises and cuts.
