City Clerk And Wife Arrested In Hot Springs

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Apr. 24.—(AP)—A series of events that landed City Clerk Fred J. Fowler and his wife in jail here yesterday after Mrs. Fowler was accused of shooting at a policeman's wife and the city hall had been partially destroyed by fire, was to be aired at a habeas corpus hearing for Fowler.

The city clerk was arrested on charges of arson, carrying a pistol and interfering with an officer after a \$20,000 city hall fire. Bond was not fixed and he instituted a habeas corpus proceeding.

The fire was said to have caused great damage in the clerk's office where a number of the city's books had been under way for three weeks. Mrs. Fowler, who also spent several hours in jail, was taken into custody when she visited the jail to see her husband yesterday afternoon. She previously had made \$1,000 bond on a charge of shooting at Mrs. Henry Terry, wife of a Hot Springs policeman, but was placed in jail and required to furnish a new bond of similar amount.

Mrs. Fowler was in Little Rock today, where she spent the night with friends after her release. She said her purpose in going to Little Rock was to obtain aid for her husband. They have been subjected to persecution by "political enemies" she said. She accused Mrs. Terry of abusing her over the telephone. Both were active in a recent municipal campaign.

The shooting and the fire resulted in the calling of a special session of the grand jury by Judge Witt to probe the occurrences. The city lost valuable records in the fire.

Monte Blue Once Shoveled Coal on Railroad

"You can't fake a railroader," declared Director Howard Brechert, recently as he watched Monte Blue back a locomotive with a string of six passenger cars right to the dot before the close-up camera. They were taking scenes for "The Greyhound Limited," Monte's latest railroad picture and his second Vitaphone production. It is the first railroad drama produced with dialogue and sound effects.

As a consequence, all the actors appearing as railroad men in the production have really had railroad service. This gives the picture an air of reality which makes it vastly more interesting.

STRIKE PARADE STOPPED AND GIRL ARRESTED

GASTONIA, N. C., Apr. 24.—(AP)—Sheriff's officers had to their credit today a second victory over determined textile mill strikers who wished to parade, and Miss Ellen Dawson, young communist, faced another charge in court.

Displaying bayoneted rifles, pistols and night sticks, the officers charged the paraders, numbering between 200 and 300, soon after they started their parade. Unlike that of the preceding day, yesterday's was broken up without injuries, the strikers dispersing quietly. Only Miss Dawson was arrested as the leader.

She had been arrested last week on a federal warrant from New Jersey charging violation of the naturalization laws. After being released, under \$2,000 bond at Charlotte, she returned to Gastonia and police accused her of precipitating the latest disturbance by taking the platform at a labor meeting and urging workers to continue the demonstration that had been halted Monday.

Rail Cutoff Will Cost \$2,555,000

WASHINGTON, Apr. 24.—(AP)—The Denver and Salt Lake railroad obtained permission Tuesday from the interstate commerce commission to build the Dotsero cutoff on condition that the Denver and Rio Grande Western be permitted to operate through the Moffet tunnel.

The Denver and Salt Lake now leases the Moffet tunnel, and proposed to build the Dotsero cutoff at a cost of \$2,555,000 for the purpose of establishing a new short-line between Salt Lake and Denver.
