MENUS

Bananas seem to be one of the few fruits always in season. They are usually quite cheap in price and are high in food value.

Since they contain a large amount of starch, we often find them served with meat in place of potatoes. This starch in an unripe banana is just as indigestible as any other raw starch. Cooking of course acts on the starch as well as ripening of the fruit. A perfectly ripe banana is easily digested without cooking since the ripening converts the starch into dextrose and sugar.

The fibrous "strings" sometimes left on bananas after peeling are indigestible, while the coating just under the peel is difficult for many people to digest. Children should have their fruit scraped before eating.

Although bananas are low in protein, they are a good source of vitamin and are classed among the "protective" foods.

As long as the skin of a banana is unbroken the fruit is sterile. The peel is a veritable germ-proof wrapper. This makes the banana one of the best raw foods available and quite safe for children.

As a banana ripens, brown spots appear on the skin. When all traces of green have disappeared even at the ends and the brown

To illustrate this the library has a most interesting exhibit of books with the label above them, "Books Most in Demand in Public Libraries Ten Years Ago." The titles for the exhibit were taken from the Bookman Magazine April 1919 and include such old favorites as "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," "H. G. spots are seen, bananas are best for eating.
Baking ripe bananas in the skin improves their flavor for many persons. They may be baked in a quick oven and only until soft and the juice just begins to flow. Longer baking makes them tough and dark, dry and tasteless.
Bananas are excellent in salads or fruit cups. Their bland flavor combines well with tart fruits. Strawberries and bananas especially are good. Whenever bananas are used alone they should be sprinkled with lemon juice to prevent discoloration.
Banana Pudding
Three bananas, 1 cup sugar, 4 eggs, 1 cup stale cake crumbs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons powdered sugar.
Peel, scrape and slice bananas. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Beat 2 whole eggs and yolks of 2 eggs with sugar, salt and lemon rind and milk. Add cake crumbs and bananas. Mix lightly and turn into a buttered baking dish. Bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Cover with meringue and bake ten minutes longer in a slow oven.
To make meringue, beat the whites of two eggs until stiff and dry. Fold in powdered sugar and pile on top of pudding.
