THE GARDEN

SPRAYS FOR FLUET Pears, plums and cherries bloom early and should have preventive sprays directed against insects and diseases which establish themselves almost when the first buds swell.

Apply, also, need a course of spraying for the same reason, though they bloom later and their spray program extends into June.

There are three sprays applicable in general to all fruits above named: 1. Bud spray, just before flower buds open. 2. Calyx spray, just after petals fall. 3. When fruit is set, about two weeks later.

A spray mixture on the basis of one-fifth pint lime-sulphur concentrate, two-thirds ounce arsenate of lead paste and one gallon of water, may be used for all three sprays.

This is known as a "summer strength mixture." If powdered arsenate is used, only one-third ounce is needed.

Aphis is controlled by lead arsenate or nicotine sprays. Currants and gooseberries should be sprayed just before leaves develop fully, with lead arsenate, two-thirds ounce arsenate of lead paste or one-third ounce powder to a gallon of water. This is a preventive against worms.

One teaspoon commercial nicotine, such as Black Leaf 40, to one gallon of water, is sufficient for aphids. Add about an ounce of soap to soften water and spread the spray.

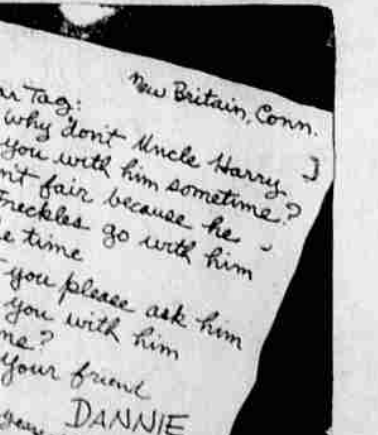

HEALTH
BACTERIA MULTIPLY WHEN CHILLING CAUSES INCREASED NASAL SECRETION

One does not have to get a cold from someone else but can produce one himself by producing abnormal conditions of the mucous membrane of his air passages. In some people a "running nose" is produced very easily, in others it is very hard to produce. Allowing the whole or any part of the surface of the body to become chilled may produce an extra amount of secretion on the mucous membrane of some part of the respiratory tract. This produces an extra amount of food for the bacteria that normally live there and produce no trouble. This extra amount of food increases these bacteria by millions. The action of these increased millions of bacteria and the toxins they produce from their growth, produce irritation and inflammation of the mucous membrane of the air passages and one has what is called a cold.

Active physical exercise in any weather and with most any amount of dress very seldom produces colds. The football player never catches cold no matter what the weather or his dress so long as he keeps playing, but his spectator often does.
