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Rain Wets Six Parks In Major League Circuits

By William J. Chinnon (Associated Press Sports Writer) Hats swept all but two major league ballparks from the schedule yesterday, leaving only Chicago and Detroit dry enough for any activity upon the field.

The Browns aimed the White Sox by 2 to 0 and the Tigers mauling the Indians by 5 to 0. The Browns managed to slip into a tie for first place with the Philadelphia Athletics, but first place at this stage of the season is nothing but a name.

What is more important than the actual position of the Browns is the pitching of Sammy Gray exhibited in handcutting the troops of Lena Blackburne. For the third time this season, the Texas Terror made a winning entry in his pitching ledger, with no defeats anywhere to be seen.

Perfect Support The home forces tonight took more hits off Gray than the Browns collected from Lyons and his relief, George Connally, in an 8 to 6 division, but Sammy never once let any doubt arise regarding his mastery of the situation. He mowed two men, and received perfect support. Twenty-five such games as he played in the wind-swept reaches of Comiskey park yesterday might make the Browns a serious pennant factor.

The contest marked the home opening of the White Sox, but it remained something of a secret. Only 10,000 of the more hardy fans were lured into the cold park.

Enid Yde in Form With opening day festivities successfully behind them, the Detroit Tigers began their work-a-day games by overpowering the Cleveland Indians as Enid Yde pitched an excellent ball. The home team outdistanced through the defense of Willie Hudlin for three runs in the first and two more in the fifth, four more than enough to win. Detroit outthrew Cleveland by 10 to 3, and the Indian drives were well scattered.

The Cardinals saw their home opening with Cincinnati postponed a second time, and countered with offering the season's first doubleheader as a Saturday attraction. First, that is, barring the morning and afternoon programs always carried out in Boston on Patriot's day. The other postponements will await the second trip for disposal.

BERLINGER LEADS IN DECATHLON

Pittsburg Negro Second in Events at Franklin Field, Philadelphia

Gould (Associated Press Sports Writer) FRANKLIN FIELD, Philadelphia, Apr. 26 (AP)—Gathering headway after a slow start, Barney Berlinger, Pennsylvania's great all-around performer, overcame Everett Uterback, University of Pittsburgh negro, and led by more than 100 points after five of the ten events had been completed today in the Pennsylvania carnival decathlon championship. Berlinger captured two of the first five events, the shot put and high jump, amassing 2915.24 points to assume a commanding position in the field of nine contenders for versatile honors. Uterback, who started off by winning the 100 meter dash and broad jump with fine performances, slipped back a trifle but held second place securely with 2823.746 points by also capturing the 400 meter run.

Two Records Broken Tom Churchill, University of Oklahoma giant, occupied third place with 2866.42 points. Clarion Cobb, of Georgetown, was fourth with 2821.75 and Robert L. Todd, of Indiana, fifth with 2325.21 points. Two records for the carnival decathlon were broken, the first by Uterback when he leaped 23 feet, 1 7/8 inches in the broad jump and the second by Berlinger when he tossed the 16 pound shot to a distance of 44 feet, 6 inches.

HIGH SCHOOLS VIE TOMORROW IN EUGENE, ORE.

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 26 (AP)—At least thirteen high schools of Oregon will be represented here tomorrow in the third annual high school relay carnival. More than 750 state high school athletes are expected to participate in the event. The complete entry lists of thirteen schools have been received. These schools are: Corvallis, Silverton, Bend, Eugene, North Bend, Vancouver, Wash., Mill City, and Hill Military, Commerce, Washington, Jefferson and Grant high schools of Portland.

The two-mile relay team of Washington High, Portland, which last year set a record, will appear again tomorrow. Vancouver High will have its record-holding sprint medley team.

Seven relay events are on the program. These are the quarter-mile, two-mile, half-mile, one-mile, sprint medley, distance medley and shuttle low hurdle.

Americans Win First Point In Ryder Cup Play

MORROWTOWN, Eng., Apr. 26 (AP)—American professional golfers took their first advantage in the four-man series of the Ryder cup play today, winning two matches, halving one and losing one. The advantage was not decided until the final foursome returned a two up victory for Walter Hagen and John Golden over Ernest Whitcombe and Henry Cotton.

MOORTOWN, England, Apr. 26 (AP)—Leo Diegel and Al Espinosa were the first point for the United States in the Ryder cup professional golf play by defeating Aubrey Rimmer and George Duncan, seven up and five to play, in the 36 hole foursome.

Diegel and Espinosa played brilliantly over the first 15 holes and piled up an advantage of seven holes before lunch. In the afternoon the lead was soon increased to eight but a late rally by the British captain and the former French champion cut the advantage to six with nine to play. The Americans, however, were too far ahead to be overhauled and the first point of the international matches went on the score card for the visitors.

Abe Mitchell and Fred Reeson evened the point score at one to one by defeating Gene Sarazen and Ed Dudley, two up and one to play. This match was all square at the half way mark and was hard fought throughout the afternoon play.

Johnny Farrell and Joe Turnesa finished all square with Charles Whitcombe and Archie Compston and the score remained tied in points 1 1/2 to 1 1/2.

Tod Morgan Will Defend His Title
