MENUS

The woman who entertains the same small group of friends every few months is often quite "at sea" for her refreshments. Something "different" is always desired, but too often this means elaborate out-of-season luxuries that strain the householding allowance.

The dessert that can be made the day before is ideal for any company meal. There are always many demands on the hostess as well as the cook when extra people are to be served, and if the hostess is also the cook the more she can accomplish the day before the better off she is.

Attractive service and garnishing do much for even the simplest dessert. Individual molds, make for a party air but sometimes take too much room in the ice box. Neat, clean-cut servings from a large loaf or mold are perfectly proper for any occasion.

Following are two rice recipes which can be served to a family or guests. Either of these desserts, served with tiny frosted cakes and coffee, would be suitable for informal bridge refreshments.

Rice and Pineapple Pudding
One-half cup rice, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 cup crushed pineapple, 1/2 cup whipping cream, few grains salt.

Cook rice in four cups boiling salted water until tender. Drain and pour over it sugar and pineapple water through fine strainer and turn into a large bowl. Add sugar and pineapple and mix lightly with a fork. Chill over night. When ready to serve, fold in cream whipped until firm. Pile on a serving dish and garnish with snips of maraschino cherries or cubes of bright jelly. Or serve on glass dessert plates with a garnish of whipped cream and cherries.

Rice Butterworth Pudding
One-third cup rice, 2 cups scalded milk, 1 cup light brown sugar, 2 tablespoons boiling water, 1/2 cup whipping cream, 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Taft's Niece Weds Britisher

Maple syrup can be substituted for the brown sugar mixture if preferred.

Wash rice and cook in milk in double boiler for 45 minutes. Add one cup maple syrup and butter and salt and cook until rice is tender and mixture is thick. Or melt brown sugar with butter and boiling water, stirring constantly and cooking until mixture is syrupy. Add to rice and continue as with maple syrup. Turn into individual molds and chill over night. Lay mold and serve with cream whipped until firm. The cream can be slightly sweetened and delicately flavored with a drop or two of vanilla or served unsweetened as preferred.

"KING" FREED; NO EVIDENCE OF SLAYING

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 25 (AP)—A Los Angeles jury today failed to find any evidence substantiating an affidavit made by Mrs. Evelyn Rosenkrantz, San Quentin convict, charging William K. Riker, leader of a religious cult, of killing "Mrs. Margaret White." They found no record that any woman of that name was missing or had ever existed under the circumstances described in the affidavit.

Riker, so-called "father" of "Holy City," the name of the community in the Santa Cruz mountains where members of the religious cult reside, was released after a day of questioning. Walter Kundert, a disciple of Riker, named in the affidavit as an accomplice, also was released.

In her affidavit Mrs. Rosenkrantz charged that Riker had choked "Mrs. White" to death at his Palms, Cal., cottage in November, 1927, and that he and Kundert had carried the body to the "Holy City" and buried it in quicklime.

Riker told police Mrs. Rosenkrantz had been trying to "injure" him and that he believed she was "mentally deranged." She is serving a life term, convicted under the habitual criminal law.
