

Divorce Case In Frisco Mentions Prominent People

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 24 (AP)—The breath of scandal blew over a score of innocent looking affidavits today and went shivers into a dozen homes as a superior judge considered the divorce action of Helbush versus Helbush.

The divorce proceedings of Herman Helbush, Los Angeles and San Francisco capitalist, and Mrs. Gwyneth Helbush, was a drab affair until late yesterday, when a score of prominent persons, ranging from motion picture directors and stars down to capitalists and negro chauffeurs were dragged into sudden publicity as Helbush filed a series of affidavits charging his wife with indiscretions from Walkiki to Los Angeles and from Hollywood to San Francisco.

Mrs. Helbush countered with another series of documents, in which she entered denials to certain of the charges and alleged that some of her husband's asserted evidence had been framed. She asserted her husband had purchased evidence against her at a high price.

Among prominent persons mentioned as attending various parties at which the alleged indiscretions occurred, were Kenneth Harlan, motion picture actor; Edna Purviance, screen actress; Lacey Nickel, miller and lug heli; Evan S. Phillips, San Francisco society man; Alton G. Murphy, Los Angeles rubber magnate, and a long line of citizens of prominence as well as chauffeurs and maids.

The first affidavit filed in behalf of Helbush was by Jack C. Sullivan, a motion picture director, who recited numerous alleged instances of intimate relations between himself and Mrs. Helbush. These were denied by the wife, who said Sullivan's signature to the document was purchased by Helbush "at a high price."

OIL MEN HELD IN SALT LAKE FOR SWINDLING

SALT LAKE CITY, Apr. 24 (AP)—Three alleged promoters of fraudulent oil stock selling schemes were being held under bond here pending arrival of extradition papers from Oregon, where the men are under indictment for unlawfully selling stocks and securities without a permit from the state commissioner of corporations.

Two of the men, E. P. B. Daude, 35, and E. E. Brown, 25, were arrested here while Charles W. Ingram was arrested at Milford.

They are alleged to have defrauded Oregon residents, especially around the city of Burns, out of thousands of dollars in false oil deals.

The three men were indicted in Oregon April 16.

Boy, 12, Is Killed By Heavy Truck

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 24 (AP)—Jake Narlosa, 12 years old, was killed yesterday when he was run over by a truck, driven by E. H. Brown. The boy was riding a bicycle. Brown told police he had noticed the boy riding 20 feet ahead of him and that the lad turned to the right. Brown continued straight ahead. He felt a jar, he said, as if the wheels of the truck had been driven over an obstruction in the street.

W. S. HAWLEY PASSES
SPOKANE, Wash., Apr. 24 (AP)—William S. Hawley, 65, prominent in northwestern oil circles, died at a hospital early today. Hawley was stricken with a heart attack Wednesday, but it was not until last night that his condition was considered grave.

LEGION HEAD SAYS HOOVER VOICES TRUTH

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 24 (AP)—Paul V. McNitt, national commander of the American Legion, and dean of the law school at Indiana University, thinks President Hoover's address on disregard for law was "a most startling statement."

"You cannot make people good by law," McNitt declared here yesterday. "I have a feeling that the average citizen has no disregard for the law, but that he is dissatisfied with the way it is administered. After all, the real thing that is needed is social justice."

"But President Hoover said what everyone realizes is the truth," McNitt commented. "While everyone realized it, no other high official had the nerve to tell it."

BIG STRIKE IN INDIA
BOMBAY, India, Apr. 24 (AP)—A large scale cotton mill strike was started here today. Employees of 38 out of 54 mills responded to the labor leaders' general strike call and threw down their tools after the general lunch period.

A total of 100,000 men was involved.
