Steady Butter Demand Sending All Grades Up

PORTLAND, Apr. 26 (AP)—Steady demand for butter sent all grades up half a cent today. Extra hatted at 45c standards and prime firsts in eggs went up half a cent to 24c. Other grades were unchanged. California strawberries have reached the local trade and are finding eager buyers at 5.72 per crate of 15 pints. Oranges are up 26c for the larger sizes. Tomatoes are still pointing upward because of the conditions at the Mexican line, where special assessments are being levied for their passage. Onions are somewhat weaker. New potatoes are firm with still higher prices expected.

BOSTON, Apr. 26 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The wool trade has passed through another quiet week, although not without some business being done. Medium wool prices have steered a little more, while fine wools have held fairly steady. Most activity in the west is reported from California in the range of 21c for the poorest short southern to 24c for the choicest long northern wool. Some medium wools in Idaho have moved around 31 1/2 to 32c. Most eastern buyers want to bid 30c for fine and 25c maximum for medium Ohio and similar. Foreign markets are steady. London is expected to rule fairly steady at the opening Tuesday. The goods market is in fair position, generally. Mohair is still quiet here, Texas operations this week have ranged from 50 to 55c for adult hair and a dime more for kid." Money Squeeze Hits Street And Stocks Go Down

NEW YORK, Apr. 26 (AP)—Another "money squeeze" which sent the call money rate from 2 to 15 per cent, unsettled today's stock market after an early display of strength. Early gains of 1 to 3 points were reduced, or wiped out altogether, and a number of speculative losses sank 1 to 4 points below yesterday's final quotations. In the early advance, extreme gains of 5 to 8 points were recorded by Mexican Standard Oil, Warren Brothers, International Telephone, Columbia Carbon, Curtiss Aeronautical, and American Hallways Express, but these were not maintained when a general selling movement swept through the market around midday. Selling pressure was particularly effective against Bethlehem Steel, Crosby Radio, Broughs Adding Machine and Abraham and Straus, all of which were carried 2 or more points below yesterday's final quotations.

Big Lumber Demand During Last Week

NEW YORK, Apr. 26 (AP)—A heavy lumber demand with increased business for both hardwood and softwood manufacturers is indicated in telegraphic reports from 735 mills for the week ended Apr. 25, to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association. The increase over the previous week is reported at 49,000,000 feet. McGraw-Hill construction daily reports that heavy construction operations announced in the past week were valued at \$76,000,000, compared with \$88,150,000 for the same week last year.
