A SEASONABLE RECIPE

Rhubarb Roly Poly
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup lard
1/2 cup water

Mix the flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in the fat with a knife, add the water. Pat out on a floured board until the dough is one-fourth of an inch thick. Add the rhubarb mixture.

Rhubarb Mixture
Two cups diced, peeled rhubarb (1/2 inch thick)
Four tablespoons flour
One-eighth teaspoon salt
One half teaspoon butter
One cup dark brown sugar
Mix all the ingredients and spread on the soft dough. Roll up like a jelly roll, tightly pinching the ends to prevent the filling from coming out. Place in a greased baking pan and moisten the top with two tablespoons of cold water. Sprinkle 1/2 teaspoon of cinnamon on top and bake in a moderate oven for thirty minutes. Cut in slices when ready to serve. This may be served hot or cold and with plain or whipped cream, lemon sauce or hard sauce.

HOG OUTLOOK FOR THIS SEASON MORE FAVORABLE, REPORT

Not many hogs are raised in this valley for shipment to the markets of the west or even the middle west, although in Wallowa county shipments of hogs compare very favorably with other livestock shipments, and this line of industry has proven to be one of the profitable lines in that section.

The hog outlook for 1929 is favorable. Slaughter is expected to be considerably smaller than in 1928, with some improvement in foreign demand and no material change in domestic demand. The seasonal levels of hog prices in 1929 and 1930 are expected to average higher than in 1928. If higher hog prices this year stimulate increased hog breeding, in late 1929, increased marketings in the winter of 1930-31 will again start the hog-price cycle downward.

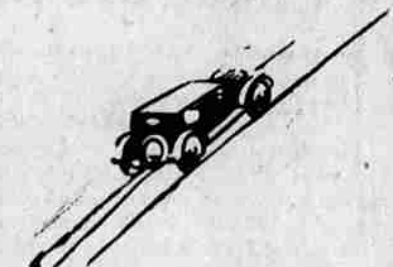
