Ryder Cup Won Today—Only Diegel and Smith Win Matches

MORTTOWN, England, Apr. 27 (AP)—British professional golfers today regained the Ryder Cup by a smashing victory in the singles after their American rivals had established a bare lead in foursome play yesterday.

The final score was registered at 7 to 5 when Ernest Whitecombe defeated Al Espinosa two up and one to play. This extended the American reversal in the singles to six defeats in eight matches played.

The British team won the first point of the singles play today when Charles Whitecombe defeated Johnny Farrell eight up and six to play in the 26 holes match.

Farrell Beaten The point gained by the match played at 2 1/2 to 2 1/4 as the Americans led by a point after the foursome yesterday. Farrell had no chance against Whitecombe's sterling game. The American open champion was two down at the first turn, six behind after 18 holes and seven down at the 27th.

Leo Diegel sent the Americans back level with the British by defeating Abe Mitchell. Nine up and eight to play.

The British went ahead when George Duncan returned a victory over Walter Hagen, ten up and eight to play.

Adopt New Plan Today For State Office Building

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 27 (AP)—Plans for the new state office building, entirely different from any others heretofore considered, were adopted by the state board of control yesterday after a protest against previously adopted plans had been made by the state supreme court.

The new plans call for a five-story structure, 200 by 94 feet in dimensions, with full basement. It will give 22 per cent more space than the previously approved plan. The exterior finish of the building will be of terra cotta, to conform with the finish of the present supreme court building. Also the style of architecture will be similar. Since the width will be the same as the supreme court building the two will present a harmonious appearance when viewed from the east with the capitol in the background.
