Special Notice

All industries and habits of the human family are changing and progressing very rapidly, the Barbers Profession is no exception as the following Rules and Regulations will show:

RULES AND REGULATIONS Governing the Sanitary Condition of All Barber Shops

Rule No. 1. Section 77, Rules and Regulations of the State Board of Health, is hereby adopted.

Rule No. 2. In general, the shop must be kept clean, tidy and sanitary at all times.

Floor must be covered with impervious covering. Hair swept up at all times and should not be allowed to accumulate in the corners.

Ceiling and walls shall be kept painted, papered or kalsomined.

Cushioning shall be thoroughly cleaned daily. Sinks shall be thoroughly clean at all times.

Rule No. 3. Papers and magazines must be picked up and kept in a tidy condition.

Workstands in front of chairs not in use shall be kept clean at all times and ready for instant use. Running hot and cold water must be installed in all barber shops.

Rule No. 4. Every tool shall be sterilized prior to use on each and every customer. The board will approve any and all sterilizers that are passed by the state bacteriologist.

or by other bacteriological authorities recognized by this board.

Rule No. 5. Brushes, combs, tweezers, etc., must be washed with soap and hot water, rinsed thoroughly in running water before sterilizing.

Rule No. 6. Absolutely clean linen must be used at all times. No towel may be used on a customer that has been used on a previous customer without being laundered. Clean towel or neckband must be used.

(Note—A freshly laundered towel is considered sterile.)

Rule No. 7. No person suffering from any skin or infectious disease shall be employed in any capacity in or about any barber shop. No barber shall serve a person afflicted with any contagious or infectious disease.

Rule No. 8. Current inspection card, showing the rating of each shop, must be prominently displayed.

Rule No. 9. Failure on the part of the owner or management to comply with the foregoing regulations shall be deemed sufficient cause to revoke license. Adopted, signed and sealed by State Board of Barber Examiners of Oregon on the 8th day of June, 1927. Approved by the State Board of Health June 10, 1927.

During the last 2 years the State Board of Barber Examiners and the State Board of Health have been working untiringly to enforce these laws—thus incurring an additional expense to the Barber of 25% to operate his shop properly. Now to meet this condition we must revise our price list to read as follows: Adult hair cut 65c, Children under 12 years 50c, Shave 25c, Neck Shave 10c extra, Haircut and shave 90c, Fitch Scalp Treatment 75c, Tonic 25c extra, Plain Shampoo 50c, Tonic 25c extra, Men or Women neck shave or clip 25c this service includes a neck line or a feather edge. No service under 25c. All other work the same as formerly.

These prices to take effect May 15 1929.
