Relay Carnival Saturday Event In Seattle, Wash.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 2 (AP)—University of Washington relay carnival records begin to tremble today when approximately 150 athletes from 23 Pacific northwest universities, colleges and high schools commenced arriving here for the tenth annual meet in the Washington stadium tomorrow afternoon.

The carnival has been divided into five divisions including: Pacific coast conference class A—Universities of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, and Washington and Oregon State colleges.

Northwest conference, class B—University of British Columbia, Gonzaga university, Pacific university, College of Puget Sound and Hollingham and Cheney Normal schools.

P. C. Freshmen—Washington, Idaho and Washington State colleges.

The class A athletes will compete in 11 events, class B in three; freshmen three, and the state and Seattle high schools two for a total of 21.

The six Pacific Coast Conference teams will seek places in the 100-yard dash, 120-yard high hurdles, 440 relay, two-mile relay, 500 relay, medley relay, four-mile relay, shot put, pole vault and all events.

The under-articles from the Northwest conference and P. C. freshmen will vie for honors in the 100-yard dash, medley relay and mile relay.

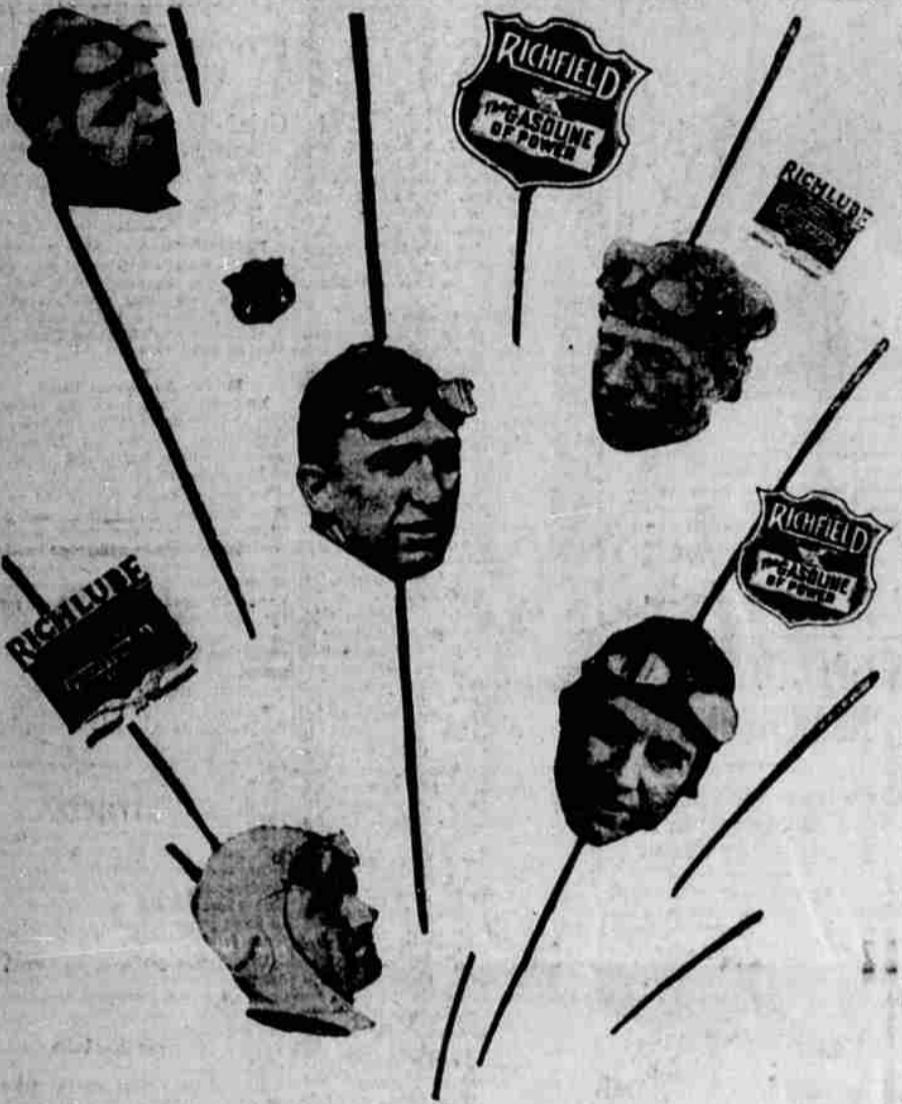
